

Ken joined the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District in 1984 as a history teacher. Ken loved teaching and held “favorite teacher” status for many of his students. Ken was a mentor and inspired many to enter the field of education. Ken was a teacher of teachers.

Ken’s many achievements in his rewarding career included serving as President of the Teacher's Union, Summer School Principal, Key Club Advisor, Assistant Principal, Principal and Assistant Superintendent. Ken served the Dennis-Yarmouth district and community with passion for 37 years; a tenure marked by compassion, excellence and humility. His dedication, enthusiasm and compassion formed the foundation of the legacy he leaves behind.

Ken was an avid photographer. As he walked the halls of DY High School, many a student would stop to pose for a picture or share what they were doing. He also enjoyed reading, especially about history, train watching, bird watching, chess, hiking in the woods and walking on the beach. Ken could always be found cheering on his granddaughter Sophia at her field hockey games. The Town of Dennis is pleased to dedicate the 2021 Annual Town Report to all involved in donating supplies, labor, and expertise in support of building the Veterans Home as well as our partner the Cape and Islands Veterans Outreach Center. The Veterans Home opened its doors in 2021 to men and women who served our country, to give back and to serve those who served our country in uniform, to provide temporary shelter and a fresh start as they get back on their feet, enabling them to find employment and a place to live. Despite the delays with the project, the Town is incredibly grateful for the voters' support of the \$300,000 Community Preservation Committee grant, the financial and material donations, and the many months of volunteer labor for every aspect of the build, from the foundation to the roof, from the interior to the landscaping, to make this home a reality for local veterans.

In 2021, CIVOC provided 567 counseling sessions and 700 referrals for veterans for housing, medical, and social security-related assistance. Additionally, 1,700 meals were delivered to Veterans and their families. The Town thanks all the members of Cape and Islands Veterans Outreach Center and to all the business and community support for the Veterans Home in Dennis and we looked forward to this continued partnership into the future.

SELECT BOARD

We are honored to present the 2021 report of the Dennis Select Board. Over the past few years, we have had to adapt and change how we operated to comply with state COVID-19 public health regulations and to ensure the safety of staff and the public. How we conducted business looked different, our personal and professional lives felt different, even going to a restaurant felt different, but the one thing that did not change is the resolve of the residents and your affinity for the town. In adapting how we operate, we are grateful for the dedicated staff, Town Administrator Liz Sullivan and all of the Administration, department heads, first responders, and to all municipal employees, as well as the volunteers who serve on boards and committees, who have been instrumental in keeping the gears of government turning.

The 2021 Annual Town Meeting was held, again, under the tent at the Wixon Innovation Middle School, on May 8, 2021. Despite the pandemic, the Town was able to provide much needed services, and a budget was passed at the Annual Town Meeting within the confines of proposition 2 ½ and despite public health restrictions, the Town's overall revenues and expenses were better than projected, due to thoughtful planning and caution while planning for the unknowns of the pandemic. At the Annual Town Election on May 11, the voters re-elected Christopher Flanagan to the Select Board, who was re-elected as Chair for the 2021-2022 year. John Terrio remained Vice Chair, Christopher Lambton remained as Licensing Chair, and Paul McCormick as Clerk.

At the Special Town Election in November, voters overwhelmingly elected to secure the construction of a new Fire Station 2 off of Paddock's Path in Dennis. We thank the Fire Station 2 Building Committee and Town Staff for their diligent efforts to get this project from concept to construction in the span of a year. We look forward to the completion of the project in 2023.

In response to the pandemic, the Town received funds from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, which enabled the town to procure equipment, sanitation services, and offset other related pandemic expenses. Additionally, the Town received an allocation of \$725,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funding for this year, which was primarily earmarked for wastewater infrastructure, which has been used for the following: \$200,000 for Hydrogeological Study/Screening of Sties 1 & 2; \$385,000 for Phase I Survey; and \$115,000 for Wastewater Project Coordinator. The remaining \$725,000 is to be received in 2022.

In the Fall, we welcomed our senior citizens and their friends back to the Dennis Senior Center, under its new name Dennis Center for Active Living (DCAL). The completed renovations will provide new space for activities and meetings in the Golden Age Program. The Select Board was happy to assist and serve in the annual DCAL Holiday Party as well as the Veteran's luncheon.

Upon further reflection of 2021, especially while steering through many unknowns, we are continuously reminded of how fortunate the Town of Dennis is to have such an incredibly talented and devoted professional staff and volunteers who serve on boards, commissions, and committees, who dedicate an innumerable number of hours to make

the Town of Dennis an incredibly special place to live. There are always challenges, and much work ahead of us; however, we sincerely thank you for your help and support, and it is because of your involvement that we are able to accomplish goals and better position the town for the future. The future of the Town of Dennis remains to be bright because of you, your commitment to our town, and your contributions.

We also want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank you for your understanding and flexibility throughout this pandemic over the last two years. Although there have been many variables this year, what remains constant is what makes our community great – our great community.

We appreciate all we were able to accomplish together in 2021 and look forward to working with you in 2022. It is truly an honor to serve you.

TOWN CLERK

Our year started off with the Town Hall and Town Buildings still being closed until early June, due to the Pandemic. Safety protocols were still in place with my office being spread throughout the Town Hall or partially working remotely from home. We continued to utilize Zoom for Marriage Intentions, Swearing-in and Meetings. Our Dog Licensing and Doing Business As, permits, were conducted through our “On-line” permitting software.

2021 was still a challenge with COVID-19, but we were able to muster through all that needed to be done. We held our Annual Town Meeting outside, under a tent at the Wixon Middle School and the 2 Elections were held at their 5 separate Precinct locations. The Fall Special Town Meeting was held inside at the Wixon Middle School.

The breakdown of Town Meetings are as follows:

May 8, 2021 – Annual Town Meeting, voter turnout of 284

October 26, 2021 (postponed till November 2, 2021) – Special Town Meeting – voter turnout of 444

The breakdown of our Elections are as follows:

May 11, 2021 - Annual Town Election, voter turnout of 581 – 4.49%

December 7, 2021 – Special Town Election, voter turnout of 877 – 6.90%

This year we held our 10th Annual Dennis’s “Top Dog Photo Contest” with Lilly as the Top Dog of Dennis for 2022. On motion of Dennis Historical Commission Member, Frank Dahlstrom, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted pursuant to the Community Preservation Act, G.L. c.44B, to appropriate and transfer \$51,163 from the Community Preservation Historic Preservation Reserves Fund as a grant to The Cultural Center of Cape Cod for restoration of the Cultural Center of Cape Cod, pursuant to a grant agreement between the Select Board and The Cultural Center of Cape Cod to fund the historic restoration of the current building located at 307 Old Main Street, South Yarmouth, MA 02664 and further, to authorize the Select board to enter into said agreement, upon such terms and conditions as they deem appropriate, which shall include the acquisition by the Town of a historic preservation restriction pursuant to G.L. c. 184, §§ 31-33.

ARTICLE 20. On motion of Select Board Member, John Terrio, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted, in accordance with the Select Board's Fee Limitation By-Law, to amend the following Assessing Department Fees:

Assessing Department Abutters List Fee - increase from \$0.50 to \$15.00 to be placed into the general fund and further, that said fee may be amended from time to time by the Select Board in accordance with said by-law.

ARTICLE 21. On motion of Select Board Member, Christopher Flanagan, duly seconded, it was voted by majority, to transfer \$10,000 from free cash to fund the activities of the Duffy Health Center, Inc. to provide the Town with support services to those persons with a substance use disorder.

ARTICLE 22. On motion of Select Board Member, John Terrio, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to adopt Article 22, in accordance with MGL Chapter 41, Section 110A, to authorize the Town Clerk's office to remain closed on all Saturdays and to treat Saturdays as a legal holiday for purposes of calculating the time frame for filing matters in that office.

AN ACT RELATING TO LICENSES FOR THE SALE OF ALL ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES NOT TO BE DRUNK ON THE PREMISES IN THE TOWN OF DENNIS

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:

SECTION 1. (a) Notwithstanding section 17 of chapter 138 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, all votes, orders and actions taken by the licensing authority for town of Dennis providing for 5 licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises in excess of the number of said licenses authorized by section 17 of chapter 138 of the General Laws are hereby validated, ratified and confirmed.

(b) The licenses authorized by this act shall be subject to all of said chapter 138, except said section 17.

(c) A license granted by the licensing authority of the town of Dennis for the sale of alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises prior to the effective date of this act shall remain in full force and effect provided that the licensee continues to comply with said chapter 138 and the terms and conditions of its license.

(d) The 5 licenses authorized by this act shall be in addition to any determination of the number of licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises to be granted by the town pursuant to section 17 of chapter 138 of the General Laws.

(e) If a license authorized pursuant to this act is cancelled, revoked or no longer in use, it shall be returned physically, with all of the legal rights, privileges and restrictions pertaining thereto, to the licensing authority and the licensing authority may then grant the license to a new applicant under the same conditions as specified in chapter 138 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 24. On motion of Select Board Member, Chris Lambton, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to transfer the care, custody, management and control of Parcel No. 421-10 from Select Board held for the purposes for which it is currently used to the Town of Dennis Conservation Commission for conservation purposes of a parcel of land located at Island Creek Lane, East Dennis, shown on Assessor's Map as Parcel No. 421-10 as more particularly described in Deed recorded in Book 5608, Page 290 recorded with Barnstable County Registry of Deeds.

ARTICLE 26. On motion of resident, Robert Mezzadri, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$331,780.00 to make temporary repairs to Duck Pond Road Ext. (from Great Western Way northeasterly for a distance of 1,600 feet, more or less, to a cul-de-sac) a private road in South Dennis, open to and used by the general public within Dennis, pursuant to the provisions of MGL Chapter 80 and the Town of Dennis “Temporary Repairs of Private Way By-Law”, Chapter 156 §3-6, adopted at the May 3, 2005 Annual Town Meeting under Article 31, and in accordance with the vote of the Board of Selectmen on March 2, 2021, declaring that the repairs to said private way are required because of public necessity and convenience, and further, that the owners of said land benefited by said temporary repairs shall be assessed their proportionate share of betterments as specified in said by-law, and in accordance with Chapter 117 of the Acts of 1997 (Town of Dennis Betterment Assessment and Fund Act).

ARTICLE 27. On motion of Select Board Member, John Terrio, duly seconded, it was voted by majority, to transfer \$280,000 from free cash to pay for the costs of the owner’s project management, architectural and engineering services for developing plans, specifications and bid documents associated with repairs to the existing Senior Center building located at 1045 Route 134, including the payment of all costs incidental and related thereto.

ARTICLE 29. On motion of Select Board Member, John Terrio, duly seconded, it was adopted and voted 197 yes to 13 no, to expend \$13,400 from the Barrier Beach Protection/Stabilization Fund to pay the salaries for two (2) seasonal piping plover monitors for West Dennis Beach.

ARTICLE 30. On motion of Select Board Member, Chris Lambton, duly seconded, it was voted by majority to transfer \$9,400 from free cash to pay for environmental and survey services to include an existing condition plan for William Crowell Road Dennis, MA 02638 relative to a proposed roadway project to extend William Crowell Road from Corporation Road to the beach of Cape Cod Bay.

ARTICLE 31. On motion of Select Board Member, Paul McCormick, duly seconded, it was adopted and voted 149 yes to 73 no, to transfer \$300,000 from the Solar Special Revenue fund to the Wastewater Stabilization Fund and further to transfer a sum of money for the purpose of future wastewater needs.

ARTICLE 32. On motion of Select Board Member, John Terrio, duly seconded, it was defeated and voted 134 yes to 74 no (2/3's vote needed) to transfer \$660,000 from the Wastewater Stabilization Fund to fund the survey and preliminary design for the Phase 1 Wastewater Program for the Town of Dennis only.

ARTICLE 33. On motion of Citizens Petitioner, Joshua Brimdyr, duly seconded, it was voted by majority to indefinitely postpone the article. To see if the town would vote to transfer from free cash the amount of \$6,200, to be used for training on the CivicsPlus platform, the website solution for the Town's website, to enable municipal committees to improve communication to the general public, and for hiring a consultant to publish a weekly newsletter that aggregates Town committee and department website postings and other news, to improve the visibility and understanding of municipal activities.

ARTICLE 34. On motion of Citizen Petitioner, Alison Schmidt, duly seconded, it was adopted and voted 92 yes to 65 no, to adopt the proposed Commercial Single-Use Plastic Water Bottle Ban By-Law: to adopt the following as a general by-law and to insert it into the Code of the Town of Dennis, Massachusetts.

Section 1. Sale of Single-use Plastic Water Bottles

Effective on December 31, 2021, it shall be unlawful to sell non-carbonated, unflavored drinking water in single-use plastic bottles of less than one gallon in the Town of Dennis. Enforcement of this regulation will begin December 31, 2021.

Section 2. Definitions

A single-use plastic bottle is a beverage container made from any type of plastic resin.

Section 3. Exemptions

Sales or distribution of non-carbonated, unflavored drinking water in single-use plastic bottles occurring subsequent to a declaration of emergency (by the Emergency Management Director or other duly authorized Town, County, Commonwealth or Federal official) affecting the availability and/or quality of drinking water to residents of the Town shall be exempt from this bylaw until seven days after the declaration has ended.

Section 4. Enforcement

Enforcement of this article shall be the responsibility of the Town Administrator or his/her designee. The Town Administrator shall determine the inspection process to be followed, incorporating the process into other Town duties as appropriate.

Any establishment conducting sales in violation of this article shall be subject to a non-criminal disposition fine as specified in G. L. Chapter 40 § 21D. The following penalties apply:

- First violation: Written warning
- Second violation: \$150 fine
- Third and subsequent violations: \$300 fine

Each day a violation continues constitutes a separate violation, incurring additional fines. Any such fines collected shall be payable to the Town of Dennis.

All businesses will be routinely inspected until the Town Administrator deems the inspection to no longer be required.

Rationale:

Single-use plastic bottles impact environmental health, and the health and longevity of other species, who may ingest plastic as food. Ultimately, plastic re-enters the human food chain where the adverse consequences are both known and emerging. Plastics pollute and impact our environment across their lifecycle from production to use to disposal.

Over 1,500 single-use plastic water bottles are used and discarded in the U.S. per second. Elimination of the use of single-use plastic water bottles will have a significant impact on future plastic-based pollution including the nation's greenhouse gas footprint and is consistent with protection of the natural environment in Dennis, Barnstable County, our nation and our earth, which we have a common responsibility to protect and steward.

(a) Notwithstanding Section 17 of Chapter 138 of the General Laws the licensing authority of the Town of Dennis may grant one (1) additional license for the sale of alcoholic beverages to not be drunk on the premises pursuant to Section 15 of said Chapter 138 to Frank R. Manoli, or its successors or assigns, for an establishment to be located at 1381 MA:134, South Dennis, MA 02660, in the town of Dennis. The license shall be subject to all of said Chapter 138 except said Section 17.

(b) 'The licensing authority shall not approve the transfer of the license granted pursuant to this act to any other location, but it may grant the license to a new applicant at the same location if the applicant files with the licensing authority a letter from the department of revenue and a letter from the department of unemployment assistance indicating that the license is in good standing with those departments and that all applicable taxes, fees and contributions have been paid.

Chaudhry, or its successors or assigns, for an establishment to be located at 894 Route 134, South Dennis, MA 02660, in the town of Dennis. The license shall be subject to all of said Chapter 138 except said Section 17.

(b) The licensing authority shall not approve the transfer of the license granted pursuant to this act to any other location, but it may grant the license to a new applicant at the same location if the applicant files with the licensing authority a letter from the department of revenue and a letter from the department of unemployment assistance indicating that the license is in good standing with those departments and that all applicable taxes, fees and contributions have been paid.

(c) If the license granted pursuant to this act is cancelled, revoked or no longer in use, it shall be returned physically, with all of the legal rights, privileges and restrictions pertaining thereto, to the licensing authority, which may then grant the license to a new applicant at the same location under the same conditions as specified in this act.

ARTICLE 37. On motion of citizens petitioner, Michael Doherty, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to indefinitely postpone the article.

To see if the Town will vote to Consider an amendment to 93:5. Area of unlawful discharge. To eliminate and make unlawful the discharge of firearms on and around Swan Pond and Great Island or within a distance of two hundred (200) feet from the waters of Swan River. The undersigned residents are forced to endure gunshots beginning at dawn and throughout the day into the evening. This continues to present a clear danger to adults and children who kayak & paddle board in the winter (Yes, there are many). The intended targets of this hunting of waterfowl in the area is widened to include swans, ducks, & fish. Every week swans are brought into the Cape Wildlife Center in Barnstable with extreme symptoms of lead poisoning. They feed off the muddy bottom of Swan Pond which is presently littered with lead shot. Without timely intervention, the swans typically die from this and even, then sometimes it is too late. The continued lead pollution of Swan Pond is devastating to all the creatures that inhabit the area. Bald Eagles, swans, ducks

and fish are in peril from this pollution. In addition, shell casings can be found in Great Island and on the shores of Swam Pond.

Moderator Chamberlain asked the assembly to kindly rise and salute the flag.

On motion of Finance Committee Chairman James Plath, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to waive the formal reading of the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1. On motion of Jim Plath, Finance Committee Chair, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$115,301 for budget 100193-57400 – 51 – Property/Liability Insurance, from the 2021 Annual Town Meeting Article #4 (FY22 Budget) line item #51.

ARTICLE 2. On motion of Jim Plath, Finance Committee Chair, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate \$30,000 for budget line item 100640-53800 – 134 – Credit Card Convenience Fees, from 2021 Annual Town Meeting Article #4 (FY22 Budget) line item #134.

ARTICLE 3. On motion of Jim Plath, Finance Committee Chair, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to transfer from Free Cash \$36,281 to supplement the FY2022 Line Item appropriations under Article 4 of the May 8, 2021 Annual Town Meeting.

To see if the Town will vote to amend Article I, §8-2 and 8-3 the so-called Finance Committee By-Law that sets forth the Appointments, organization and Filling of vacancies on the Finance Committee, so that as amended, the sub sections will read as follows:

“§8-2 Appointments; organization.

There shall be a Finance Committee consisting of seven (7) members all registered voters of the Town of Dennis. There shall be an election of four (4) Finance Committee members from the citizens of the Town at the next Town election after such bylaw becomes effective. Two of the elected Finance Committee positions shall be for a two (2) year term and two for a three (3) year term. The Moderator shall appointment three (3) members for two (2) year terms. Elected Finance Committee members shall serve upon election. The Moderator shall appoint members to fill vacancies within thirty (30) days of the close of an Annual Town Meeting to fill those places vacant by reason of their term of office expiring. Said Committee shall choose its own officers and shall serve without pay.

§8-3 Filling of vacancies.

Whenever a vacancy occurs in said committee, said vacancy shall be filled by the appointing authority and the appointment shall be to fill out the unexpired term of the person whose office has been vacated. OPEN CASES

1. Burke v. Dennis Building Commissioner
Suffolk Superior Court,
(07500-0235 – AEK)

This recently filed complaint alleges that the Building Commissioner violated the Civil Rights Act by interfering with TVB Trust’s right to due process when a building permit application was denied and he issued a cease and desist order against a lot located at 23 Uncle Bills Way. The issue of whether the lot can be built upon has been the subject of lengthy litigation. The Town’s insurer is providing a defense.

2. Burke as Trustee of the TVB Trust v. The Town of Dennis, et al.
Land Court, C.A. No. 21 MISC 000158-DRR
(07500-0312 – AEK)

This is an appeal of the February 22, 2021 decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals to uphold the Building Commissioner’s determination that the parcel of land located at 23 Uncle Bill’s Way is not a buildable lot. The Town filed a notice of appearance on March 31, 2021. The parties have been engaged in discovery. On December 10, 2021, the plaintiff filed a motion to compel further discovery and depositions, which the Town has opposed. The Land Court has scheduled a hearing on the plaintiff’s motion for February 28, 2022.

3. Conservation Commission v. Great Western Sand & Gravel, et al.
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 2072CV00412
(07500-0308 – AEK)

The Town brought this action to abate nuisance activities, trespass and conversion of materials on the Town’s property located off Ben Baxter Road, which is under the custody of the Conservation Commission. The Town is seeking an order to prevent the defendants from continuing to expand an existing nonconforming excavation/sand and gravel business onto the Town’s property. The Town is also seeking damages from the trespass and an order that the defendants restore the area of encroachment. The defendants filed an Answer to the Complaint on December 29, 2020. The defendants have also filed a restoration plan with the Conservation Commission, however upon evaluation by Town Staff, it is not adequate to properly restore the area. We have reached out to defendant’s counsel to relay the issues are waiting to hear back.

4. Linhares, et al. v. Town of Dennis Planning Board, et al.
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 1872CV00690
(07500-0292 – AEK)

This is an abutters' appeal, pursuant to G.L. c. 40A, §17, of a decision of the Planning Board to issue a special permit for the demolition of an existing residence and development of 24 two-bedroom residences, 25% of which will be deed-restricted affordable units, on property located at 28 Alexander Drive. The Town is maintaining a passive defense, allowing the co-defendant, as the true party in interest, to defend the relief granted. This matter has been continued as the related case, *White v. The Town of Dennis Board of Health* was appealed to the Appeals Court and has not yet been decided. The Court continued the pretrial conference to April 8, 2022.

5. Mariani, et al. v. Town of Dennis Planning Board, et al.
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 2172CV00055
(07500-0311 – AEK)

This is an abutters' appeal, pursuant to G.L. c. 40A, §17, of the Planning Board's February 2, 2021 decision granting a special permit for the construction of duplex units at property located at 232 Upper County Road. The Town is maintaining a passive defense, allowing the co-defendant, as the true party in interest, to defend the relief granted. The private parties have filed cross-motions for summary judgment, which are pending before the Court.

6. Silver Leaf Homes, LLC v. Town of Dennis Conservation Commission
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 2172CV00028
(07500-0310 – AEK)

This is an appeal, in the nature of certiorari, of the December 4, 2020 decision of the Conservation Commission, denying the plaintiff's application for an order of conditions to replace an existing house and to replace and/or relocate a failing septic system at 16 Bowsprit Lane. On May 28, 2021, the Conservation Commission served the administrative record of proceedings and the parties requested a stay of proceedings pursuant to settlement discussions, which was allowed by the Court until January 7, 2022. The plaintiff submitted a new notice of intent to the Commission and the public hearing was continued several times to December 2, 2021.

7. Teleen/Kuehn v. Dennis Conservation Commission, et al
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 1972CV00639
(07500-0304 AEK)

This is an appeal, in the nature of certiorari, of the Conservation Commission's order of conditions denying the plaintiffs' application to construct a beach access stairway from the upland over a bulkhead to the beach on the servient estate at 30 Captain Donald Path. The plaintiffs filed a motion for judgment on the pleadings and the Conservation Commission filed a cross-motion for judgment, arguing that that it appropriately denied the project under the more stringent local bylaw and that MassDEP's Superseding order does not preempt the Commission's decision. On June 23, 2021, the Superior Court issued an order denying the plaintiffs' motion for judgment on the pleadings, affirming the Commission's decision, and dismissing the case. The plaintiffs filed a notice of

appeal on August 4, 2021. On September 24, 2021, the plaintiffs ordered a copy of the hearing transcript.

8. Tonka Girl, LLC v. Town of Dennis Board of Assessor, et al.
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 2172CV00341
(07500-0376 – AEK)

Plaintiff claims to have obtained a parcel of vacant land at auction located about 700' southerly of the Mid-Cape Highway (Rt. 6) containing more than 6 acres. This lot was part of a much larger parcel of 11 1/2 acres owned by E. Felderhof, since deceased. The plaintiff is seeking a judgment directing the Town's Board of Assessors to identify the plaintiff as the owner of the Property in Board's records. There is a dispute between the plaintiff and co-defendant Town Line, LLC as to the rightful ownership of the lot and the Board of Assessors has conflicting information regarding ownership. We have answered the Complaint on behalf of the Board of Assessors. Ultimately, this appears to be a private property dispute and the Board of Assessors will list the owner of the lot as determined by the Court.

9. Trustees of the Cranberry Knoll Realty Trust v. John M. Walulak, and the Town of Dennis
Orleans District Court, C.A. No. 201826CV0045
(07500-0283-JTB/NJC)

This is an action brought by Trustees of a condominium to recover unpaid common expenses. The Town is named as defendant/party-in-interest by virtue of a tax lien. Thereafter, on June 8, 2018, the co-defendant, John M. Walulak, died and plaintiff's counsel has recently asked the Court that this matter be held in abeyance until a personal representative of Mr. Walulak's estate is appointed. This matter is still pending.

10. White v. Town of Dennis Board of Health, et al.
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 1972CV00010
Appeals Court, C.A. No. 2021-P-0091
(07500-0293 – RS1)

This case is related to No. 0292, Linhares v. Planning Board, et al. (See above).

This is an appeal in the nature of certiorari, challenging the Board of Health's recommendation that a proposed affordable housing project's wastewater system meets all state and local environmental standards. The Board of Health's recommendation was necessary in order for the Planning Board to exercise its discretion in issuing a special permit to the housing project applicant to exceed the number of bedrooms permitted on the subject property. The applicant filed a motion to intervene in the matter as the true defendant in interest.

The plaintiff moved for judgment on the pleadings and the Board of Health and the applicant each filed a cross-motion for judgment on the pleadings. On September 3, 2020, the Court issued a Decision and Order on the parties' cross-motions affirming the

Board's decision. Judgment entered in favor of the Board of Health on October 6, 2020 and Plaintiff filed a notice of appeal on November 4, 2020.

Appellate briefs were filed with the Appeals Court in the spring of 2021 and oral arguments were heard on November 15, 2021; the matter is under now consideration by the Appeals Court panel.

RECENTLY CLOSED CASES

1. Concannon v. Chief Peter DiMatteo
Orleans District Court, C.A. No. 2026CV000058
(07500-0307 – JMA)

In this case, the plaintiff appealed the Police Chief's denial of his firearms identification card application based on a disqualification. Following an evidentiary hearing held on November 20, 2020, the Court affirmed the Police Department's decision and the plaintiff failed to file an appeal. This matter is now closed.

2. Hickey, et al. v. Dennis Zoning Board of Appeals
Land Court, C.A. No. 16 MISC 000218-AHS
Appeals Court, C.A. 2020-P-0623
(07500-0374-AEK)

This was an appeal from the Zoning Board of Appeals' April 14, 2016 decision to uphold the determination of the Building Commissioner that replacement of a walkway and stairs by the neighborhood group, Pathways Association, on a way next to the plaintiffs' lot does not require a building permit or any other approval under the Town of Dennis Zoning Bylaw. On January 13, 2020, the Land Court issued judgment in favor of the Plaintiffs, annulling the decision of the Board. Specifically, the Land Court found that while the proposed stairway was not subject to the setback requirements under Section 2.3.2 of the Bylaw, the proposed stairway would violate Section 2.2.2 of the Bylaw, which prohibits the use of "structures" for "private club, members only". The co-defendants have appealed and the matter is now pending at the Appeals Court.

On July 16, 2021, the Appeals Court issued a decision reversing the Land Court's judgment and remanding the matter for entry of a new judgment affirming the decision of the ZBA; the Land Court issued judgment on rescript on August 19, 2021. This matter is now closed.

3. Walsh v. Town of Dennis and Building Commissioner
Barnstable Superior Court, C.A. No. 2072CV000096
Appeals Court, C.A. No. 2021-P-0353
(07500-0306 – AEK)

This was an abutter complaint, seeking the revocation of a building permit issued to the Town of Dennis to construct a 5-bedroom dwelling for veterans on a municipally owned lot located next to the plaintiff's property. The Superior Court denied the plaintiff's request for a preliminary injunction, finding that he failed to exhaust his administrative remedies. The Town subsequently filed a motion to dismiss and plaintiff filed a motion for partial summary judgment. On December 29, 2020, the Court granted the Town's motion to dismiss all counts and denied the plaintiff's motion as moot. The plaintiff filed an appeal on March 19, 2021 and on June 3, 2021, the Appeals Court dismissed the appeal with prejudice and without an award of costs or fees to any party. This matter is now closed.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

Under Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 56, the Board of Assessors is required to assess property at full and fair cash valuation. The Commissioner of Revenue certifies compliance with this requirement. In October of this year, the Department of Revenue approved the FY22 values and new growth. Shortly thereafter, the tax rate for Fiscal Year 2022 was established.

The average single-family home assessment increased from last fiscal year, moving from \$520,700 to \$578,900. The new property assessments reflect the Departments estimate of market value on January 1, 2021. The certified tax rate for the year is \$5.60 per thousand dollars in valuation. All property assessments can be viewed by clicking on the Assessors Database on the town website at www.town.dennis.ma.us.

Following is the Fiscal Year 2022 Property Classification, which depicts the total values and tax levies borne by each class of property for Fiscal Year 2022.

OFFICE OF THE TREASURER/COLLECTOR

A primary responsibility of the Treasurer/Collector's Office is the collection of Real Estate, Personal Property, Motor Vehicle Excise, and Boat Excise taxes. For Real Estate and Personal Property taxes, the Town uses a quarterly billing system: although bills are mailed semi-annually, each bill includes two separate payment coupons to allow taxpayers to pay on a quarterly basis. Preliminary bills are mailed on June 30, and include coupons for payments due August 1st and November 1st. Actual bills are mailed on December 31, and include coupons for February 1st and May 1st payments.

Checks must be made payable to the Town of Dennis, and to ensure they are applied to the correct bill/year, must include the applicable payment coupon. Payment is applied on the date it is received at the Tax Office – we do not accept postmark dates. Interest begins to accrue on any unpaid amounts on the day after the tax due date.

Payments can be made in person at Town Hall, by mail, electronically on our website (www.town.dennis.ma.us), or placed in the locked deposit box located at the entrance to Town Hall. Our office is open 8:30 AM - 4:30 PM, Monday – Friday, excluding holidays. Payments placed in the Deposit Box after hours will be applied on the next business day. Payments by mail should be mailed to our tax processing center at PO Box 1019, Medford, MA 02155-0011.

On the following pages I submit the annual report of the Treasurer/Collector, which includes the Ending Cash Balances for Fiscal Year 2021, the Schedule of Outstanding Receivables as of June 30, 2021 and the Annual Wage Report for Fiscal Year 2021.

CAPITAL OUTLAY COMMITTEE

The charge to the Capital Outlay Committee is to review and evaluate proposed capital projects, improvements, and equipment that have a useful life of at least 5 years; as well as a cost of over \$10,000, or which are components of a regular maintenance program. Each year, beginning in October, the Committee reviews the current year's requests as well as the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan submitted by each Department Head.

For fiscal year 2022 (July 2021-June 30, 2022), because of the Covid 19 pandemic, these meetings were not held. Members of the committee contacted the department to which each is liaison to discuss their requests. The Town Administration made its recommendations. We subsequently met twice, in person, to review and recommend a minimum amount of \$2,302,926. This amount was subsequently approved as follows:

ATM 6/23/2020 \$686,650. STM 10/03/2020 \$1,020,000. ATM 5/08/2021 \$496,276. For a list of the specific items approved at each meeting, please consult the appropriate meeting minutes.

This calendar year (2021), regular meetings were resumed beginning in November. The results of our deliberations for fiscal year 2023 (July1,2022-June 30,2023) are to be presented to the Select Board and the Finance Committee on January 18, 2022. Subsequently, the approved list will be ratified at the ATM 05/03/2022.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Dennis Police Department is comprised of exceptional men and women who have dedicated themselves to the safety, security, and wellbeing of the community. In the past year, policing has been under scrutiny at all levels of government, and our agency continues to evolve and adapt to the expanding challenges by providing a high level of professional police services. As Chief, I am proud to lead this department that truly understands community partnerships, and is dedicated to promoting a high quality of life that makes Dennis an ideal community in which to work, visit, and live.

The success of any local police department is contingent upon having the support of the community. With this understanding, I have promoted an atmosphere of transparency, openness and honesty. Staff is consistently encouraged and trained to interact with empathy and to “look beyond the call” while searching for solutions. As we all have faced immeasurable challenges in the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic, the worldwide impacts have also been felt here in Dennis. Our partnerships and support contribute to our effort to be resilient, hopeful for a return to normal.

The department has undergone some changes to remain at the forefront of modern police practices. We have restructured our command staff to ensure proper chain of command, which ensures accountability and clarifies responsibilities. We have re-branded the Community Operations Unit which has expanded to include not only traffic, school resource, community policing, and crime prevention, but the new additions of EMS Officer, Veterans Resource Officer, Family Resource Officer, and Community Services Officers (CSOs). The CSO program has been an immediate success, as we hired two seasonal college students majoring in Criminal Justice to support our function. Among their duties, the primary function was parking enforcement. Their focus was education and working with businesses to avoid citations when possible.

This past year, the police department launched a Mental Health Task Force, a project that had been in the making for quite some time. Utilizing funds from a Department of Mental Health Grant, we were able to hire three part time mental health clinicians. Along with five intensively trained officers, we now have a team dedicated to assist and follow up with those in mental health crisis. Considering the impact on mental health from COVID, the task force has made an immediate impact in our community.

In 2021, two long-time department members retired: Sergeant Brian Cummings and Emergency Telecommunications Officer Dawn Clarke. I would like to thank them both for their many years of dedicated service. Both have stayed on in part-time capacities.

Like many businesses and industries across the country, recruitment and employee retention has been a challenge for the policing profession. Thanks to a strong and positive reputation, our department has been able to attract quality candidates, and we welcomed four new Patrol Officers this year: Sarah Lake, Minor Elizondo, Daniel Ross, and Shae McHowell. Our hiring process is rigorous, which includes an extensive vetting

process, and then nine months of training before a new officer is on the street. This time-consuming effort is valuable to ensure each officer has the training and ability to meet the highest standards to which we are held as an accredited police agency.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the town's elected and appointed officials, town employees, and all police department staff members as we collaborated to work on the ever-present challenges that continuously appeared. ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

I hereby respectfully submit the Annual Report of the Animal Control Officer for the year 2021.

The role of Animal Control in the community is to protect the public from dangerous or diseased animals and to protect animals from abuse and suffering caused by humans, to promote a safe and peaceable coexistence between animals, animal owners, and the rest of the community. One important task of this department is to educate pet owners on the need to properly confine, vaccinate, and spay or neuter their pets.

Investigating reports of animal bites, injured animals, or possible neglect or cruelty are a priority for Animal Control, as well as promptly responding to complaints regarding dogs barking, roaming free, and animals behaving aggressively. Animal Control staff is available to civic groups for informational talks on many animal related topics, and we do our best to answer the public's questions and offer solutions to many animal related problems.

The Animal Control the Department would like to take this time to remind Pet Owners living here year-round or visiting, that although you think that your furry canine companion is truly the best of the best dog in the whole world when you're out in public, especially off leash, BUT most of the time this isn't the case. YES, your "perfect pooch" is the biggest lovebug out there and wouldn't hurt a fly; BUT not everyone around you, enjoying the same beautiful, peaceful, space knows this amazing quality that your dog may possess. The truth is, unless you are a professional (and I mean a certified training or dog behaviorist or certified canine handler that has had extensive training with dogs), most family dogs are usually only on their "best behavior" in the confines of their homes and yards. Our point is, one of the most common complaints our department receives are unruly dogs off leash while walking in some of our most popular areas within our town such as Johnny Kelly Park or any of our Town Beaches. There were a few folks upset over signs posted restricting dogs in certain areas that in the past have been fun, easy places to let your dog frolic and kick up all four paws for a bit. When complaints starting rolling in about owners not picking up after their pets or dogs running up to or after people sharing the same space, the restrictions had to be implemented. Look folks, we don't want to restrict any areas within the town; BUT we want Dog Owners to be aware that not everyone likes or appreciates a dog approaching them even when you say "he/she is friendly". FIRE DEPARTMENT

My first Annual Report starts with a special thank you to Fire Chief Mark Dellner, whom after 16 years with the department retired on March 31, 2021. Chief Dellner came to us from Rochester, New Hampshire at a time when the department was looking for change. And he brought it! He modeled the department with a new slogan of “Courage, Compassion and Commitment” and forged a new beginning. His tireless efforts brought the hiring of twelve firefighters and the implementation of an ambulance on the northside. With his commitment to the town and the fire service, he spearheaded a five-year drive to build a new Station 2, which was successful. As I write this report, they are breaking ground. Chief Dellner with his outward and professional personality, had the respect of local and government officials, fellow chief officers, the firefighters he led and the citizens of the Town of Dennis.

2021 also brought the retirement of Assistant Chief John Donlan after 46 years of service. Chief Donlan rose through the ranks of the department and held every position. He was a pioneer and one of the first paramedics in the state and on the East Coast. He had a true compassion for his job and furthered his commitment by teaching many of the firefighters that are working today in emergency medicine.

The retirements of Chief Mark Dellner, Assistant Chief John Donlan, Captain Wayne Conlon and Emergency Medical Services Coordinator John Adelizzi, and Firefighter Paul Prue Jr. caused a string of promotions and new hires for the department. After an extensive testing process, Captain Christopher Guerreiro was promoted to Assistant Chief of Operations, Captain Anthony Kent was promoted to Deputy Chief of Fire Prevention, Lieutenants Steve Hierholcer, Geoff Mulholland and Phelim Meehan were promoted to Captain, Senior Privates Wayne Mayo, Christopher Boutin and Brian Dunton were promoted to Lieutenant and Firefighters Charles LaCross, Bert Mosher and Michael Hersey were promoted to Senior Privates. In addition to his Lieutenant duties, Brian Dunton took over the position of Emergency Medical Service Coordinator. Our new firefighter Paramedics and EMTs include, Caleb Crowell, Sam Hammond, Kyle DiFrancesco, Leathan Doig, Diego Torres, Michael Kent, Myles Kristofferson and Nathaniel Olsen. With a new command staff, front line officers and new hires, the department is well established to meet the needs of the community for years to come.

On a sad note, 2021 brought the first Line of Duty death for the Dennis Fire Department. Lieutenant Daniel “Flippy” O’Connell succumbed to cancer related to this line of work. Cancer is a growing concern in the fire service. Lt O’Connell served this department with honor and distinction, both as a firefighter/paramedic and diver for 23 years. Dan reached out to co-workers, friends and children he met during his treatments to console them with Peace, Love and Hope. Lt O’Connell’s efforts brought life to legislation on cancer presumption for the fire service. He will be profoundly missed and, in our hearts, forever.

Covid-19 along with other Covid-19 variants continued to plague our community. With the leadership of Elizabeth Sullivan, Town Administrator and cooperation and teamwork from Board of Health Director Kristen Keller, Police Chief Jack Brady, DPW Director David Johansen, Assistant Town Administrator Greg Rounseville and department heads, the town was able to safely hold town meetings and other events that our town cherishes.

As stated earlier, progress has been made on our new Station 2 located at 350 Paddocks Path. The 9-member Fire Station Building Committee consisted of Select Board member Chris Lambton, Chairman Paul Donlan, Ron Polaske, Rich Riehle, Leah LaCross, David Nordberg and Robert Blake. After an overwhelming Special Town Meeting vote in October and a landslide ballot vote on December 7th 2021, construction of the \$14,677,779 state-of-art Station, complete with a basement for storage and a training room capable of supporting the community started on December 21,2021.

In 2021, our department responded to a total of 5,474 incidents for service or an average of 15 calls per day from our two fire stations. These responses continue to make the Dennis Fire one of the busiest fire departments on Cape Cod. Special weather events such as hurricanes and tornados are a concerning factor and appear to be more common. The town experienced its first recorded tornado on September 2nd at the intersection of East Bay View Road and Wampanoag Trail, North Dennis as remnants of IDA passed by the Cape. Though only an EF-0, significant damage was done to structures and trees.

Our department has some of the finest firefighters serving the citizens of Dennis. We routinely receive calls and positive feedback from the community. They are highly trained and respected and are the same individuals showing up at your house or business when you have a medical emergency. In addition, the town took ownership of a brand-new Pierce pumper Engine 112, which replaced a 26-year-old pumper. Through the support of the community, federal and state grants, we have the finest state-of-art equipment available to the fire service.

In closing, I wish to personally thank the Select Board, Town Administrator Elizabeth Sullivan, Assistant Town Administrator, Greg Rounseville and the members of the fire department for their faith and support in me as their new Fire Chief.

I would like to extend a special thank you to the citizenry of the Town of Dennis for supporting our fire department's needs and firefighters during trying times. I wish to thank my Office Manager, Laura McCarthy for her tireless and outstanding efforts during our transition period. And special thanks to all the other Departments, Town Boards, Commissions and employees that help us carry out our mission every day. It is this collaboration and cooperation that makes us and will continue to make us a successful team.

The 2021 calendar year for the Building Department has remained steadfast. Our personnel transitioned extremely well with challenges and opportunities that impacted all of us. HEALTH DEPARTMENT

2021 began very similar to how the year 2020 had ended. The Health Department continued to address challenges from the 2019 Novel Coronavirus. With the rollout of the COVID vaccine and the increasing number of visitors for the summer season, getting our residents vaccinated in a timely manner was an immense task. This in conjunction with our routine activities as the State of Emergency was lifted in June proved to be quite a task.

In August we continued the presentation of our annual certificates of excellence in food protection to those establishments that scored the highest during our food inspections of the previous year.

In the month of September, the Health Department hosted our annual household hazardous waste collection with 282 vehicles taking advantage of this opportunity. Also, in cooperation with Barnstable County Department of Health and Environment and the USDA, portions of the Town of Dennis were baited with rabies vaccine.

The Department continues to adjust and adapt quickly to any situation which also included staffing changes. We welcomed Jennifer Singleton as Office Manager, Office Assistant Rachel Lohr, as well as Jason Belmonte and David Coakley as Health Agents.

I would like to recognize the support of so many during this past year, especially the Board of Health and the Dennis Emergency Operations Team.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health conducts public hearings on the second Thursday of each month and holds work sessions as needed on the fourth Thursday of the month. The public is welcome at all meetings and hearings are broadcast on the Dennis local access cable channel. For 2021, the Board heard 150 cases.

The Board continued to work with landlords and tenants to enforce compliance with the state minimum standards for rental housing as well as the applicable Dennis Housing by-law. Property owners currently offering residential rentals and those considering doing so are encouraged to contact the Health Department for information regarding the Dennis rental permit requirements. Tenants seeking to file a complaint or seek information are likewise encouraged to contact the Health Department.

The Board's jurisdiction also includes issuance of permits which allow for installation and repair of septic systems. The Board conducts hearings on applications for variances from the State and Town regulations governing placement and design of septic systems for commercial and residential properties. The Board and Health Department also evaluate septic system inspection reports, all of which are required to be submitted to the Health Department if a property is to be transferred.

It may not be known in the community, but the Board annually appoints the following important roles as representatives of the Town: Health Director, Health Agents, Environmental Coordinators, Hazardous Waste Coordinators, Milk Inspectors, Burial Agents and Water Quality Advisory Committee Liaison.

As always, the Board wishes to thank the Health Director, Health Agents, and Office staff of the Health Department whose dedication, knowledge, experience and professionalism is appreciated. The Board is also grateful for the support provided to the Health Department by the Administration and the Select Board.

PLANNING AND APPEALS OFFICE

The Department of Planning and Appeals continues to be very busy. During this ongoing pandemic, the Department did not miss a beat. The Department provides assistance to many town committees including the Planning Board, Board of Appeals, the Affordable Housing Trust, the Community and Economic Development Committee and, as needed, the Alternative Energy Committee. As always, working with all of these committees has led to another challenging and intriguing year.

Highlights/Accomplishments:

1. **Affordable Housing** – The Planning Department was engaged in a number of housing proposals over the past year. One project was reviewed and approved by the Planning Board. There are a number of potential projects that are in the pipeline, that were reviewed with the Select Board towards the end of the calendar year. The Department has also coordinated the update to the Housing Production Plan and is in constant discussion with people looking to provide expanded housing opportunities in town. Perhaps the top accomplishment of the past year has been getting residents moved into the Dennis Veterans Home!
2. **Dennis Port Revitalization** – Dennis Port continues to make significant strides forward. This past year has seen a great deal of interest in various properties in the village that are on the market. Perhaps the most significant project has been the reinvestment in the Pelham House and their continued investment in other local properties, from providing workforce housing in the village to expanding to properties in West Dennis.
3. **Exit 78** – Work continues on the vision for a higher density mixed use area, that serves as a “live, work, shop” focus for the future of Dennis. The Housing Production Plan recognizes the importance of a new development scheme for infill housing in areas such as Exit 78.
4. **Municipal Vulnerability Plan** – The Planning and Engineering Departments coordinated on a grant for Pound Pond in Dennis Port under the implementation goals of the Municipal Vulnerability Plan adopted priorities for Dennis.

I would like to thank my new Principal Office Assistant, Kelly Race, her enthusiasm and work effort is key to the Department being able to accomplish all we do.

PLANNING BOARD

The Town of Dennis Planning Board continued to push through 2021 without a glitch during COVID. The Board met 15 times in 2021 and reviewed 18 applications plus discussed State changes to the Zoning Act related to Housing Choice, development of a Local Comprehensive Plan Update RFP and Housing Production Plan.

During 2021 the Planning Board applications remained relatively level despite the pandemic. Reviews included 6 Special Permit applications, one of which came to the Board under the affordable housing by-law; 6 Approval Not Required Plans; 4 requests to release lots from previously approved subdivisions; 2 zoning amendments; and 1 meeting to vote to take a bond from an old subdivision that has not finished the required road work.

The Planning Board engaged the public in discussions of the Housing Production Plan Update, hosted a Joint Meeting on State Changes to the Zoning Act for Housing Choice and discussed the scope of work for an update to the Local Comprehensive Plan.

The Planning Board would like to thank Town Planner, Daniel Fortier for all his efforts on behalf of the Board. The Planning Board would like to thank Principal Office Assistant, Kelly Race and welcome her to the Planning Office. ZONING BYLAW STUDY COMMITTEE

The Zoning Bylaw Study Committee (ZBSC) held regular meetings during 2021, both remotely and in person. The Committee continued its work on a proposal for a new Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) zoning bylaw for the Town.

Working from a matrix of suggested parameters for the Dennis bylaw, along with comparative components of similar ADU bylaws adopted by other Cape Cod towns, the ZBSC made significant progress in outlining an ADU bylaw. As it did in 2020, the committee continued to collect and review data from Town departments, including GPS maps of the Town's housing stock, lot sizes, flood zones, and residential density. Committee members also gathered new data from other towns about their recent experiences with ADUs, and sought additional input from local housing experts.

The ZBSC typically meets on the second and fourth Mondays of the month. We thank our Building Commissioner Paul Fowler, Town Planner Daniel Fortier, Select Board members, Town Administration, and GIS Support Specialist Alicia Messier for their support and contributions.

MIS - INFORMATION SYSTEMS

The MIS department supports all town departments as they rely on computers, email, phones, scanners, etc. to perform their daily tasks. We have made major improvements to our network thereby improving the end users experience.

This year saw many challenges and accomplishments for the MIS Department. With the pandemic we faced the new challenge of keeping operations open and running with remote access, social distancing and changes to work flow.

We outfitted the Council on Aging's new addition with state-of-the-art technology including phones, and a camera system in the new ball room allowing us to produce and broadcast meetings for Chanel 18 from that location. The Transfer Station also came on line in 2021 with fiber network connections and new wiring throughout.

2021 saw an upgrade in our email services and financial software, and our permitting system allows the end user to apply for permits online with ease.

We were awarded a Cyber Security grant which allowed us to train staff in the latest Cyber Security concerns. Staff participated in hands on training, and we were recognized as one of 35 Cyber Aware Communities from the Executive Office of Technology Services and Security.

With the help of Zoom and desktop cameras we continued to conduct meetings, appointments and interviews while being mindful of social distancing requirements as we kept town operations running.




GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM (GIS)

It has been over a decade since the GIS Specialist position was filled with the plan of helping organize existing town data and maps and begin the task of digitizing it for posterity.

Again, with this year was filled with challenges making it useful to have an implemented GIS. With social distancing continuing throughout most of the year we helped with things custom mapping such as Town meeting layout again (See image right), created custom online maps



for some committees to utilize (See image left), and continued to try and keep our GIS based applications up to date such as our online permitting database. These continued challenges for staff and committees working remote and in person proved an easier process with continued access to GIS capable staff and up to date online GIS maps.

Some good news, the Town just received new infrastructure data layers from the Cape Cod Commission Regional Aerial flyover project of 2019. These new layers include everything from sidewalks to building footprints. This data will be making its way onto our public online GIS map throughout 2022.

The GIS is an ever-valuable information warehouse and is used in various projects year to year. Another such project this year was for the Cemetery Department. After some unfortunate vandalism at Dennis Village Cemetery it was decided to inventory all existing damage at all Town cemeteries; which is still on going. The collected data was utilized to create a report used in an RFP for two Town cemeteries. This report was useful developing priority as well as organization with what was needed to fix each damaged stone. (See image right).

And as always, the continual reminder that the online GIS portal; which began in the spring of 2010, is still up and running. It can still be found at www.town.dennis.ma.us under "Online Services."

GOVERNMENT INFORMATION ACCESS CHANNEL 18

At Dennis Channel 18 our main goal is to provide uninterrupted gavel to gavel coverage of public meetings and regulatory boards.

2021 was a bit more relaxed with mask requirements and meeting room capacity so most meetings were hybrid- some people in the board room- some participating remotely, while some were strictly remote participation. Hybrid meetings allow residents to attend and speak at meetings from home if they are not comfortable with, or able to attend in person.

Media Specialist, Jeff Clough continues to work with other departments to produce informational and educational programming such as promoting beach and recreation activities, as well as contributing to the “Wastewater Wednesday” information outreach efforts.

The foundation of Channel 18 is our great camera crew, who consistently produce high quality live broadcasts and archival recordings of over 200 board meetings a year. They are constantly asked to learn new platforms and implement tools like Zoom, as well as run Power Point presentations while covering meetings.

Live streaming and Videos-On-Demand are available on the Town’s website where you will find an archive dating back to 2015. Recordings from 2008-2014 are available on request. DVD copies of archived meetings are also available for a nominal fee.

Our programming is also available on **Apple TV and Roku**. Search apps for **Cablecast Screanweave**, and once installed search in app for Town of Dennis TV. And new in 2021 is the **Cablecast App** for smart phones and iPhones, so you can access Channel 18 content, live or archived, anywhere you are.

The EDC would also like to thank the Zoning By-law Study Committee, Planning Board and Town Planner Daniel Fortier. We would also like to thank Eileen Gregory, for her assistance over the years. Her decision to move on to new endeavors will be a loss for the Committee.

The Committee also met with the new owner of the Columns Building in West Dennis to discuss his plans to convert the property into housing. The proposal was reviewed against the goals for the West Dennis Village Center Zoning that was crafted by the CEDC and found to be consistent with the goals that were established for the future of West Dennis.

The Committee would like to thank Dennis Town Planner Dan Fortier and his Principal Office Assistant Kelly Race for the support they provide to the CEDC.

DENNIS MUNICIPAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST

2021 presented the Dennis Affordable Housing Trust with rebuild challenges amidst a more normalized congregation as we resumed in person meetings. Having established a consistent Trust roster with role assignments in place at the end of 2020 that allowed the Trust to focus on the needs at hand. To kick off the year, the Trust worked on wrapping up the final draft of the Housing Production Plan with the Barrett Group. Working into the spring to codify the HPP was the Trusts first completed priority. While the HPP hasn't been formally adopted yet, the Trust felt that it had crafted a version tight and informative enough to present to the community. The HPP included both public and private comment, select board and planner review, as well as data that was aggregated from years past in addition to futures.

The Trust shifted its attention to hiring a part time Housing Coordinator after completing work on the HPP. Co- chairs, Josh Mason and Coco Raymond met with the town's Human Resource Director, Deborah Heemsoth and the town's Director of Finance, MaryAnne Gibbs to work on the Housing Coordinator position logistics. Along with the Trust, a job description was drafted and posted. The Trust was only able to attract two candidates over the course of three months, both of whom resigned prior to their respective interviews. Being a part time position and a lack of benefits were cited as the major caveats by the applicants. The Trust will be reorganizing their efforts to ensure a Housing Coordinator is hired as soon as possible.

Coming out of Covid and not having a Housing Coordinator on the roster, has made it challenging to accomplish meeting the needs of our community with respect to additional affordable inventory. However, the Trust did have a few notable accomplishments that will help to ensure success in 2022. The Trust brought in another member, Kayla Hilts, a young professional and local realtor who grew up on the Cape. Kayla brings a fresh perspective and wealth of knowledge to the Trust. The Trust was also able to vote on and allocate \$200,000 toward four affordable units within the Columns redevelopment project. Unfortunately, the project folded following an unsuccessful effort by its owners to acquire additional funding through the town at a recent Town Meeting. Additionally, the Trust was able to extend both \$175,000 and \$125,000 CPC grants which were initially extended to the Trust in 2019.

The Trust is hopeful to hire a Housing Coordinator within the first quarter of 2022. With several projects in the pipeline through the town Planner's office and local organizations, 2022 should be very active for the Housing Trust. The Trust is committed to ensuring the Town of Dennis moves from the bottom of affordable housing development on Cape Cod to the top.

CAPE COD COMMISSION

The Cape Cod Commission works toward maintaining a healthy balance between economic progress and environmental vitality. “Keeping a special place special” describes the agency’s mission to protect the region’s unique qualities.

As I reported last year, the Commission was served with a Citizen Petition to focus the Regional Policy Plan (RPP) on addressing climate change by adopting a series of amendments to the current RPP. After hearing presentations from the Commission staff and from the citizen petitioners, the Commission decided that the subject of Climate Change was important enough to deserve its own plan. After ten meetings by a Sub-Committee of Commission Members, four Zoom meetings with four sub-regional working groups and Commission Staff to get local input and concerns, and countless hours by staff to draft the Climate Action Plan and two Technical Bulletins that will give guidance to future development on Cape Cod that will help climate control, in January of 2021 the full Commission gave its approval for the Climate Action plan. In February of 2021 the Assembly of Delegates adopted Ordinance 21-02: Cape Cod Commission Amendments to 2018 Regional Policy Plan for Climate Change Mitigation, and was subsequently approved by the Board of County Commissioners. There was one Development of Regional Impact Decision for the Town of Dennis in 2021. Great Western Road Solar, Dennis proposed to redevelop a 13.9 acre +/- lot at 131 Great Western Road by installing an approximately 3.1 MW solar photovoltaic array with battery storage on 8.5 +/- of the lot. After two Sub-Committee Public Hearings, the Sub-Committee voted to recommend to the full Commission approval of the project. At a meeting of the full Commission on September 9, 2021 the project was approved.

THE CAPE COD REGIONAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY

The Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority (CCRTA) has provided a total of 25,974 one-way passenger trips across all services in the town of Dennis from July 2020 through June 2021 (FY21). CCRTA provided 6,011 Medicaid trips, 5,400 Day Habilitation trips, 382 ADA trips, and 0 other medical trips for Dennis residents. CCRTA also provided 16 Dennis residents with 70 trips to Boston area hospitals through the Boston Hospital Transportation service.

CCRTA provided 289 Dennis residents with 8,344 DART (Dial-a-Ride Transportation) trips during FY21. Total DART passenger trips in the fifteen towns of Cape Cod were 89,565 in FY21. The fixed route Hyannis to Orleans (H20) serves the towns of Barnstable, Yarmouth, Dennis, Harwich, Chatham, Brewster and Orleans along the Route 28 corridors. A total of 25,974 one-way trips originated in Dennis for the H20 route for the period July 2020 through June 2021. Although we do not track alighting's, it is assumed that an approximately equal number of riders ended their trips in Dennis, including some who began and ended their trips in Dennis.

Total ridership for the H20 route for this period was 110,383. CCRTA supplied the Dennis Council on Aging with two Mobility Assistance Program (MAP) vehicles that provided 1,771 rides from July 2020 through June 2021. Route maps, schedules, fares, Google Transit Trip Planner and the latest news about Cape Cod public transportation services are provided at www.capecodrta.org, as well as links to many other transportation resources.

CAPE LIGHT COMPACT

Dennis Representative – Brad Crowell

Cape Light Compact JPE is an intergovernmental organization consisting of the 21 towns on Cape Cod and Martha's Vineyard and Duke's County. The Compact's mission is to serve our 205,000 customers through the delivery of proven energy efficiency programs, effective consumer advocacy, and renewable competitive electricity supply.

Effective July 1, 2017, the Cape Light Compact reorganized itself as a joint power's entity pursuant to Massachusetts General Law Chapter 40 Section 4A1/2, becoming the first joint powers entity in Massachusetts. Reorganizing as a joint power's entity protects member towns from potential liabilities and mandates greater financial accountability through expanded reporting requirements to the Massachusetts Department of Revenue and member Towns, and designation of Treasury functions to an independent entity.

POWER SUPPLY

During the year 2021, the Compact's power supplier for all residential, commercial, and industrial customers was NextEra Energy Services of Massachusetts (NextEra). The Compact is pleased that our residential price remained price-competitive with the utility's basic service residential price, while also being 100% renewable.

The Compact has been a green aggregation since January 2017, meaning 100% of Compact's power supply customers' annual electricity usage is met with Renewable Energy Certificates (RECs). By retiring RECs to match the Compact's customers' usage, Compact customers are financially supporting renewable energy resources, including resources located on Cape Cod. In addition, NextEra deposits all premiums paid for voluntary RECs, plus their supplier and retail fees (expected to total over \$3 million per year), into a trust fund to be used solely for the development of new renewable energy resources. By purchasing electricity through the Compact, all Compact power supply customers are supporting renewable energy and acting locally to combat climate change.

In March 2019, the Compact launched two new power supply options, CLC Local Green 50 and CLC Local Green 100, which have been updated as of December 2021. The CLC Local Green program gives customers an option to support local renewable energy development by paying a small premium on their monthly electric bill. The Compact uses this premium to purchase and retire Massachusetts Class 1 RECs such that a total of either 50% or 100% of customers' annual electricity usage is matched with Class 1 RECs, inclusive of the RECs retired as part of the Compact's standard power supply product. These

additional Class 1 RECs are sourced from renewable energy projects in New England, including several solar installations on Cape Cod.

At a regional level, New England continues to face electricity pricing spikes during the winter months. Over the last fifteen years, New England has greatly increased its reliance on natural gas for electricity production; however, natural gas pipeline capacity has not substantially increased during that same period. This creates a supply shortage of natural gas for electricity production during winter cold snaps, and therefore increases prices for electric generators, which is passed on to all New England power supply customers. Until such time as this issue is resolved, either through additional natural gas or electric transmission infrastructure, demand reduction, or other targeted programs, the possibility of future high winter pricing remains, and as such, consumers should still expect seasonal pricing fluctuations for the foreseeable future. The Compact will continue to seek ways to help customers reduce their electricity costs through innovative energy efficiency programs to mitigate the impacts of higher winter electricity pricing.

As of December 2021, the Compact had approximately 17,124 electric accounts in the Town of Dennis on its power supply.

CONSUMER ADVOCACY

Since 1997, Cape Light Compact has advocated for the ratepayers of Cape Cod and Martha's Vineyard at the local and state level.

In 2020, the Compact's primary consumer advocacy focus was on redesigning its Cape & Vineyard Electrification Offering (CVEO). The Compact expanded its coordination with Massachusetts stakeholders to redesign CVEO. The redesigned CVEO focuses on the following:

- Consistency with the 2018 amendments to the Green Communities Act and will advance the goals and objectives of these amendments while providing cost-effective energy savings and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.
- Serving low-and-moderate income members of the Cape and Vineyard community, a population that faces economic barriers to installing the three technologies proposed under CVEO.
- Address the economic barriers such as the high up-front costs and inability to qualify for a loan.
- Through the installation of cold climate air source heat pumps ("CCASHP" or "heat pump") CVEO advances the Commonwealth's goal of beneficial strategic electrification and the greening of the building sector.

The Compact also participated in regulatory proceedings at the DPU related to the retail electric market, pushing for policies that promote a competitive power supply market while ensuring common-sense protections for consumers.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Cape Light Compact offers an energy efficiency program that provides technical assistance and valuable incentives and rebates to residential and business customers, whether you rent or own your home or business space. The energy efficiency programs give customers the power to take control of their energy use, reduce their energy bills, and protect the environment.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY COMMITTEE

AEC conducted its 12 regular monthly meetings, some in person some remote/virtual this year as conditions dictated.

The Committee's overall goal is to develop strategies to reduce the "carbon footprint" of the Town of Dennis. Its top priority and primary activity for 2021 was developing a strategy and proposal for the installation of electric vehicle charging stations. EV Charging Stations are evolving into a near-necessary tourist amenity, in addition to being a desirable convenience for residents. We have identified a dozen sites in town for public use charging stations. We have studied engineering, procurement and construction options and buy or lease options related to this fast-moving technology. Several funding sources are available via state and industry grant programs.

We also continue to follow progress of the energy conservation projects funded by the initial Green Communities Designation Grant and look for other opportunities. The Town attained Green Communities status in 2019.

The Committee was saddened by the loss of member, Gary Wilson. Gary was an active and enthusiastic member who contributed to many of the group's accomplishments over the past several years. Gary passed away in June 2021 after a long battle with cancer.

Committee Charge: "The Committee shall identify and review renewable energy options that meet the goals and objectives established by the Board of Selectmen. The Committee shall explore and analyze topics such as energy production facilities, infrastructure, efficiency and conservation measures, regional opportunities and funding/grant opportunities. The Committee shall advise and assist the Town Administrator and Board of Selectmen on the analysis and development of these opportunities/projects."

WASTEWATER IMPLEMENTATION COMMITTEE

The Wastewater Implementation Committee (WIC) resumed monthly meetings in March. WIC continued to work with consultants, David Young, Michaela Bogosh and Kara Johnston from CDMSmith. Two Town Meeting articles for Wastewater were proposed for May Town Meeting. Article 31 to reallocate \$300,00 from the Solar Special Revenue Fund to the Wastewater Stabilization Fund passed. Article 32 which requested \$660,000 from the Wastewater Stabilization Fund for survey and preliminary design for Phase 1 of the Wastewater Program did not pass. Discussions with Harwich and Yarmouth concerning the formation of the DHY Clean Waters Community Partnership ended in June when Harwich chose not to continue with the proposed agreement. However, Harwich left open the possibility of working with Dennis in the future to solve wastewater needs. The committee's focus was to finalize the Town's Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan (CWMP) and to identify and study acceptable Effluent Recharge Sites in Dennis.

In September, the Select Board followed the recommendations of WIC and voted to use American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, in the amount of \$700,000, to move the wastewater program forward. First, GHD Environmental Engineering Consulting Firm was hired as the Town's Wastewater Projects Coordinator. Russ Kleekamp was designated to be the committee's contact person. Second, survey work for Phase 1 of the CWMP was done by Dawood Survey Company. Third, hydrogeologic studies for Effluent Recharge Sites 1 and 2 of the CWMP were conducted by CDMSmith, as well as screening to assess future effluent recharge sites. Finally, the Town moved forward with two proposals from the School of Marine Science and Technology at UMASS Dartmouth, to update water quality assessments for Swan Pond River, Bass River and Sesuit Harbor and to perform water quality modeling for Swan Pond if needed.

An Effluent Recharge Workshop was held in November to address the Town's effluent recharge needs and the concerns of the Dennis Water District. All Town department heads as well as the Dennis Water District Superintendent were in attendance. Work on acceptable recharge sites is ongoing. Also, in November, the Town's final CWMP was filed with the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act Office (MEPA). MEPA reviewed the CWMP and issued a Certificate of Approval on December 29, 2021. The Cape Cod Commission will complete a 208 Consistency Plan Review of the CWMP early next year.

WATER QUALITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Dennis Water Quality Advisory Committee (DWQAC) is concerned with the fresh water quality in Dennis. It conducts such studies and investigations necessary to advise and make recommendations and/or endorsements to other the Selectmen, other Town boards, committees, and commissions, as well as Barnstable County and the Cape Cod Commission (CCC). It receives support from the Dennis Department of Natural Resources.

In 2021, the DWQAC did not meet. Typically, the Committee volunteers test 8 ponds once a year during August. Those ponds being tested are Bakers, Eagle, Flax, Fresh, North Simmons, Run, Scargo and Whites and were tested using the Cape Cod Pond and Lake Stewards (PALS) Snapshot sampling procedures.

Based on the information provided in the SMAST Report from 2016 regarding the progressive downward condition of the ponds, the committee continues to monitor any issues that may impact pond water quality in town. In particular the DWQAC continues to work closely with the Wastewater Implementation Committee to make sure pond protection is included in any plans going forward as well as with the Department of Public Works to ensure that road runoff into ponds is strictly controlled or eliminated.

The Town is always looking for new members to the DWQAC. Anyone interested in serving on the Water Quality Advisory Committee can contact the Town Manager's office.

Throughout 2021 the Facilities Division encountered significant impact driven by COVID-19 and its variants. Much like the previous year, Facilities found their role split between assuring Town-owned properties remained functional while developing infrastructure to help control the spread of COVID. The infection control measures that Facilities implemented allowed critical Town functions such as sticker sales, golf and Town Meeting to continue with complete success.

Facilities skillfully and effectively performed the routine housekeeping work that is done each year such as opening and closing beaches, park and other seasonal structures, rebuilding lifeguard chairs, seasonal turnover of air conditioning systems across town from heating to cooling all while completing over 1,600 corrective and preventative work orders. Facilities has long been the lead element for Safety at DPW. This year through the extraordinary efforts of the DPW Safety Committee we became compliant with our chemical inventory and updated the departments Safety Data Sheet library which we then shared with Golf and Harbor to assist them with managing their own safety programs.

Despite the restrictions of COVID, Facilities also undertook a number of internal projects. These projects varied widely in scope and were well outside the normal range of activities our in-house workforce would perform. Some examples of this work are as follows:

- Upgrade of the electrical service for the Sesuit Harbor maintenance building.
- Rehabilitation of the starter shack at the Dennis Pines golf course.
- Installation of a ductless split air conditioning system at Police Headquarters.
- Installation of a vehicle lift in the Dennis Pines maintenance building.
- Fabrication of plexiglass shields/guards for employee COVID protection.

The division also assisted other departments with experience and practical advice throughout the planning and execution of larger contracted projects. This year Facilities brought their expertise to a number of capital projects including the Senior Center Addition, Fire Station No. Two, the Transfer Station Upgrade, Town Hall Air Conditioning Repairs, Old Wharf Rd. beach stairs and the Glendon Beach Comfort Station assuring the Town received the quality and craftsmanship it bought in the contracting process. Facilities also initiated an examination of outstanding repair work required across the Town's portfolio of properties. This resulted in the presentation of a five-year plan for reducing the Town's deferred maintenance to a joint session of the Select Board and the Finance Committee in August setting the stage for a proactive approach for preserving the Town's investment in its properties.

HIGHWAYS/GROUNDS

This team is proud of their accomplishments considering the impact of COVID-19. Some projects successfully completed during the year include:

- Continued maintenance of town wide COVID-19 protocols
- Disinfection of all town buildings per COVID-19 protocol
- Set up Annual Town Meeting and Special Town Meeting at Wixon School
- Bridge maintenance and repairs at Light House Road
- Creek maintenance at Baker Way Landing in partnership with Cape Cod mosquito control
- Maintained road shoulders across town in preparation of road resurfacing and line painting
- Brush mowing, tree pruning and debris removal along town roads and walking trails
- Fabrication and installation of new steel gates at West Dennis residents beach
- Fabrication and installation barriers for plover protection at West Dennis Beach; installed beach grasses and indigenous plantings to dissuade foot traffic in dunes
- Repaired asphalt and drainage at the Dennis Port Municipal Lot
- In June DPW deployed six goats to Scargo Tower to assist in managing the vegetation growth on the North slope

A partial list of annual work completed during 2020:

- Performed 679,500 feet of roadway line striping and 100 crosswalk markings.
- Restriped three municipal parking lots and five beach parking lots.
- Installed and removed 1,800 beach signs.
- Cleaned 124 catch basins and another 43 catch basins were inspected by DPW. personnel; an additional 1,200 catch basins were cleaned by our contractor.
- 550 miles of roadway were swept last year generating nearly 700 tons of waste.

- Replaced 74 street signs due to accidents, vandalism & theft.
- Repaired 17 traffic signals.
- Performed layout for line striping contractor on nine resurfaced roads.
- Graded numerous dirt roads and cut away overgrowth at various intersections which blocked sightlines of oncoming traffic.
- Deployed six goats to Scargo Tower in June for maintaining the under growth on the Northern slope.
- 80 tons of trash removed from beaches, landings and harbor; this critical service operates year-round and 14 hours per day from Memorial Day to Labor Day.
- The snow and ice season saw 16 events requiring plowing or sanding, four of these were plowing. The seasonal snow measure was 23”.
- Removal of windblown sand at the West Dennis, Mayflower, Bayview, Dunesview, Cold Storage and Horsefoot beaches, and Dr. Bottero Road multiple times during the year.
- Raking and disposal of 570 tons of seaweed and debris from Town beaches.
- Mowing, trimming and mulching of planting beds at parks, cemeteries, municipal buildings and other locations.
- Commissioning and decommissioning of irrigation systems at parks, municipal buildings, cemeteries and other locations at beginning and end of season.
- Installation and removal of life guard towers, attendant booths, boardwalks, snow fences and storm blocks at beaches.
- Assist with installation and removal of docks at Sesuit Harbor and Bass River.

There were three significant events DPW completed last year. Due to the ingenuity and professionalism of the women and men of the DPW this work was executed flawlessly and saved significant cost to the Town.

- **Crowes Pasture footbridge repair:** In partnership with Engineering and Natural Resources the DPW crew replaced the old, broken footbridge in the marsh. Through their strategic reuse of materials and equipment on hand DPW was able to rebuild this bridge better than ever before for less than \$5,000.
- **The Volkswagen Diesel Emissions Grant:** An enormous thanks to Greg Rounseville for successfully landing a \$415,959 grant which subsidized the purchase of three heavy dump trucks valued over \$613,000. As part of this vehicle replacement opportunity DPW needed to retrofit existing equipment from the old vehicles into the new vehicles. This required sanders, plows and associated hydraulic systems to be thoroughly integrated with the new vehicles. Thanks to the professionalism and technical expertise of Mechanics Anthony Chiurri and Tom Martin the Town saved thousands of dollars by reusing this older equipment and extended its serviceable life by several years.
- **October 2021 Nor’easter:** This two-day storm caused significant impact to the Town and DPW resources. DPW responded skillfully to more than 130 calls and worked in close coordination with Dennis Police, Dennis Fire and the Town Emergency Management Team to keep our roadways safe and open for emergency access at all times. The total cost of the cleanup was \$121,000. The good ending to his story is that when operations concluded, all concerns were

addressed, all equipment was in working order and most importantly the DPW team was in great shape and there were no safety mishaps.

In 2021 Highways and Grounds bid farewell to two of our key players, Lance Giannelli who has moved on to new opportunities out of state and Kevin Robichaud who assumed a role at the Transfer Station. Both these men will be sorely missed. We also welcomed Equipment Operator Tyler Crowell into the division. Tyler brings with him many years of experience in construction and DPW operations and he is a welcome addition to our team.

CEMETERIES

The DPW manages and maintains fourteen cemeteries within the five villages of Dennis. The maintenance of the cemeteries includes grass mowing and trimming, periodic pruning of trees, raking leaves, spring and fall clean up's and intermittent plantings to retain the solemnity of the spaces. Of the fourteen cemeteries five are active burial grounds; Oak Ridge, Dennis Village, South Dennis Congregational Church, Swan Lake Annex, and West Dennis. We would like to thank and acknowledge the special efforts of the Cemetery Advisory Committee; Diane Rochelle (Chair), Terri Fox (Vice Chair), Bonilyn Heleen, Jane Stevens and Joseph Theroux, who tirelessly volunteer their time and effort for the improvement of Town cemeteries.

This year the Cemetery Advisory Committee assisted with obtaining a grant extension for the CPC-approved Burial Marker Preservation and Repair project at South Dennis Congregational Church and West Dennis cemeteries. This extension enabled the award of contract with Gravestone Services of N.E. The burial marker preservation repairs started in November and is planned for completion in the summer of 2022.

In late October the Town was battered by a Nor'easter which caused significant tree damage throughout the town. The cemeteries were not spared and in November the DPW hired a tree contractor to remove several large trees that had fallen prey from the storm. The professional efforts of the contractor led by Cemetery Coordinator Becky Smith finished the work expeditiously and without any impact to the services and internments.

In the fall of 2020 DPW discovered 13 cemetery monuments in Dennis Village Cemetery were desecrated by vandals. DPW immediately determined that the highly specialized nature of the situation required the services of an experienced outside contractor to complete the repairs. DPW quickly engaged the contractor to make the repairs and the work was completed in July.

After much hard work the Oak Ridge Cemetery Master Plan was delivered in December. This plan details the long-term development opportunities for the 44 acres of wooded land remaining on site. When fully developed these plans will preserve burial opportunities to the residents of Dennis for the next 150 years. Oak Ridge has

also saw some much-needed maintenance work last year. Repairs were made to a number of water spigots which had failed and plans were developed for additional water service into Section P. Beautification efforts have also continued at the entrance and throughout the cemetery with flowers, plantings and planning for replacement of the white pines damaged by pine beetles.

In 2021 DPW received 98 interment orders, 70 grave lot sales and 48 monument mark-out requests. The sale of burial lots continues in Swan Lake Annex and Oak Ridge Cemetery, if interested in a purchase or have any other inquiries please contact our office at 508-760-6220.

SOLID WASTE and RECYCLING

With the first year in operation complete, the value of the new Transfer Station facilities is in plain sight for all to see. Over the last year we saw an increase of 7% in recycling and waste disposal despite the phased change over in traffic lanes which required great patience. We are immensely pleased the traffic patterns have now smoothed out making possible a quicker, more efficient means to dispose of waste for the citizens of Dennis.

Again, last year through the increased recycling efforts of all our citizens, the Transfer Station users supported a number of public charity organizations during these very difficult times. We are pleased to offer host to these organizations whose good work goes right back into our community: The American Red Cross, Salvation Army, Family Pantry, Goodwill, Discover Books, Bay State Textiles and the ReStore (Habitat for Humanity).

Our partners at the Barnstable County Cooperative Extension and the Tony Kent Arena once again facilitated our Household Hazardous Waste Collection events. An environmental win for all, these events are open to Dennis residents and the broader Cape Cod community as well. Through a grant from the MA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), the DPW partnered with the Health Department and the Water District to sponsor three events free of charge to Dennis residents. Residents can also take advantage of other Cape wide events for a minimal charge. This program safely disposes of hazardous materials and eliminates the possibility of those materials polluting our waters.

The employees of the Transfer Station are committed to providing quality service while encouraging reuse and recycling. Our team is always available to assist our citizens whether it be pointing them to the right place to off load trash, or assisting with lifting of heavy bags. Last year the Transfer Station received and processed 12,347 tons of material which was made up of the following:

- 3,870 tons of municipal solid waste (MSW).
- 1,226 tons of construction and demolition materials.
- 2,983 tons of organics; brush, leaves, grass clippings and 570 tons of seaweed.

- 1,767 tons of recyclables; cardboard, paper, plastic, televisions, computers, mattresses, glass, metals, tires, batteries, textiles/clothing, and books.
- 2,501 tons of asphalt, brick and concrete (ABC material).

The processing of mulch, loam and recycled asphalt create material for the Town to use at a low cost as well as some material for the public. A Food Waste Collection Program was implemented using funds received from a MA DEP grant and last year 11 tons of food waste was recycled. The food waste is recycled by Watts Family Farm in Sandwich, MA, where it is processed into a compost material. All these efforts help to responsibly dispose of waste while minimizing operational expenses and maximizing services to the public. In support of those initiatives the following grants were obtained and/or utilized:

- \$13,200 recycling dividend grant obtained from the MA DEP Sustainable Materials Recovery program.
- In 2021 the town repurposed a total of 1,200 tons Processed Glass Aggregate (PGA) through our seven-member town regional PGA recycling program. The PGA program takes clean bottled glass and processes it into a crushed aggregate product that can be used for a wide range of purposes. This particular aggregate was used for pipe bedding in the Orleans town sewer project and Dennis/Yarmouth's new middle school project. An additional 2,200 tons of clean bottled glass was processed into PGA in November and will be used on these and other similar projects.
- Utilized MA DEP grant funds to sponsor Household Hazardous Waste Collection.
- Utilized MA DEP grant funds to supplement Food Waste Collection Program.

In 2021 the Transfer Station saw a remarkable turnover in staff with several team members moving on to other opportunities and an influx of new, talented staff anxious to do their part for our citizens. We were fortunate this year to welcome Chris Campbell into our scale house and Nick Spintig into our recycling line. In addition, we are very pleased to announce the promotion of Kevin Robichaud to the position of Transfer Station Crew Leader. The entire DPW is proud of all the great work we accomplished together for the citizens of Dennis. Our talented team of experienced professionals knows how to work together and get the job done so that our community looks more beautiful each day and our citizens get the services they need. The complications brought about by the pandemic made our job no easier and with great appreciation to our partner departments our team was able to find the right balance so everyone would succeed.

In closing, we would like to thank the members of our partner committees, the Alternative Energy Committee, the Cemetery Advisory Committee, the Community Preservation Committee, the Solid Waste and Recycling Committee, and the Town

Historical Committees for their gift of time and focus which directly benefits every member of the Dennis community. My sincerest appreciation goes out to all departments, the administration and particularly the Town Administrator, Liz Sullivan, for her guidance and support throughout the year. It is our commitment to each other that allows us all to have such success serving our citizens.


CEMETERY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Cemetery Advisory Committee is charged to make recommendations to the Select Board regarding rules & regulations for Dennis cemeteries and plan for future improvements. We are responsive to lot owners' interests & concerns. We continue to preserve and promote the historic setting and significance of our cemeteries.

Continuing in the health emergency, we met nine times in 2021, four of them as zoom meetings. We were able to hold two outdoor burial stone cleaning workshops, one at South Dennis Congregational Church Cemetery and one at Dennis Village Cemetery. A master plan for Oak Ridge Cemetery continues to be developed by the BSC Group, Inc.

Vandalized burial stones at Dennis Village Cemetery were repaired by Gravestone Services of New England, thanks to a special fund transfer approved by the Select Board and the Finance Committee. Stone repairs at South Dennis Congregational Church Cemetery and West Dennis Cemetery continue, funded by a Community Preservation Act grant. Community volunteers have cleaned stones at Paddock, Dennis Village & West Dennis Cemeteries, as well as others. Their dedication is immensely appreciated.

Our committee of five appointed members greatly appreciates the dedication and assistance of Director of Public Works David Johansen, Assistant Director, Thomas O'Connor and Cemetery Coordinator Rebecca Smith. They are normally held at 4 p.m. on the 4th Tuesday of each month at the DPW Headquarters, 120 Theophilus Smith Road. Please check the town website for scheduled meetings. The public is always invited to attend.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

The Dennis Engineering Department provides survey, design and construction oversight in the maintenance and replacement of various Town infrastructure. Staff also provides technical reviews and construction oversight of new subdivision roads and commercial site developments, administers Road Opening, Utility, Construction, and Stormwater permits, along with road petitions, assigns house numbers and together with the Dennis Police Department, monitors traffic safety issues. Engineering also serves as the liaison to the Road Safety Task Force.

In 2020, the Engineering Department coordinated the resurfacing of approximately 9 miles of roads with a combination of asphalt and rubber chip seal. Cracksealing and patching maintenance work was also performed on various roads and parking lots throughout town. Engineering worked with abutters along Duck Pond Road to make roadway improvements through the Temporary Repairs on Private Ways petition process.

Drainage systems were either replaced or installed at 10 different locations throughout Town. The drainage work included installing best management practices to improve the quality of stormwater runoff.

Wastewater planning made major progress in 2021 with the submittal of the Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan (CWMP). The CWMP outlines the town's plans to install a wastewater collection system and treatment facility to remove nitrogen from the Bass River and Swan Pond River watersheds in order to improve water quality. Engineering is assisting the coordination effort working with the Wastewater Implementation Committee (WIC) and the Town's wastewater design consultant.

Engineering continued to work with MassDOT on upgrading the Route 28 corridor within Dennis. The section in Dennisport from Dennis Commons to Upper County Road was successfully completed in the spring, adding much needed sidewalks, bicycle lanes, and intersection safety improvements. The project also included aesthetic improvements including brick sidewalks, stamped crosswalks, decorative lighting, benches and landscaping to beautify the downtown area. The project was advanced through the Cape Cod Transportation Improvement Program (CCTIP) and was constructed with state and federal funds.

Engineering continued to work on two additional (similar projects) along Route 28, both of which are at the 25% design level and also eligible for federal and state funding for construction. The section of Route 28 that extends east from the Dennisport project to the Herring River in Harwich, will be reconstructed and include upgrading the traffic signals at the Upper County Road and Division Street intersections. Construction on this section is scheduled to start in 2024. The other section in West Dennis, from the Bass River to Old Main Street, is awaiting funding and will include similar improvements in the downtown area of West Dennis that were made in Dennisport. Engineering is also coordinating with MassDOT on the replacement of the Route 28 bridge over the Bass River. This work is tentatively scheduled for 2024.

Engineering continues to provide design and support in meeting federal and state requirements for stormwater quality. Best management practices to remove contaminants from stormwater are incorporated in all drainage designs. Staff administers various grants to help fund this effort. This year, Engineering received a Municipal Vulnerability Grant (MVP) to design improvements to Pound Pond at Seaview Park. Once designed, the project should be a good candidate for construction funds to dredge and elongate the pond to restore the pond from a stagnant water body to a flourishing pond.

CAPE COD JOINT TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

The Cape Cod Joint Transportation Committee (CCJTC) is the Regional Transportation Planning Advisory Group to the Cape Cod Metropolitan Planning Organization (CCMPO). Each of the 15 towns within Barnstable County is represented on the CCJTC. The group's primary responsibility is to prioritize transportation projects that will use State and Federal funds dedicated to the Cape Cod region. The Cape Cod Transportation Improvement Program (CCTIP) 5 Year Plan is the document voted by the CCMPO and updated annually, that prioritizes and dedicates funding for regional projects.

The distribution of State and Federal funding receives intense scrutiny and is subjected to lengthy project reviews by Federal Agencies and the Massachusetts Department of Transportation officials. It takes years for a local project to successfully move from concept to design, to funding authorization and finally to construction. In general, projects that are funded under the CCTIP are transportation projects that are considered to provide a regional benefit, and because of their large estimated construction costs, are difficult for individual towns to fund.

The Town of Dennis has been very successful in submitting projects through the CCJTC and receiving constructing funding through the CCTIP. Previous projects have included the reconstruction of Setucket Road, Swan River Road, Route 134, the extension of the Cape Cod Rail Trail and the Route 28 corridor.

The Route 28 Streetscape project in Dennisport was completed this spring. The project added bicycle lanes, sidewalks and made intersection improvements to reduce speed and improve safety. Aesthetic improvements including brick sidewalks, trees, benches, bike racks and ornamental lighting greatly enhance the visual appeal of the downtown area.

Two other projects along Route 28, one from Dennisport into Harwich and one from the Bass River to Old Main Street in West Dennis, are advancing in design. The 25% submittal for the Dennisport-Harwich section was submitted in Fall 2019. A design public hearing is scheduled for early 2022 with construction scheduled for 2024. This project will upgrade the intersection and traffic signals at Upper County Road and Division Street and extend the sidewalks and bike lanes from the Dennisport project to the Herring River in Harwich. The 25% design plans for the West Dennis section are scheduled to be submitted in Spring 2022. The section will be very similar to the Dennisport section, adding sidewalk, bike lanes, upgrading intersections and making aesthetic improvements in the downtown area. The project is currently awaiting funding through the CCTIP.

ROAD SAFETY TASK FORCE

The mission of the Road Safety Task Force is to be an advocate for town residents to bring their concerns of safety for motor vehicles, pedestrians and bicycles for discussion, investigation and possible remedy. Our committee consists of 5 regular members and 1 alternate and town liaisons from the Police and Engineering departments. We normally meet on the third Thursday of the month at 4:30pm in the Department of Public Works (DPW) building. During the Covid19 pandemic we have been meeting on Zoom. Details are included in the agenda appearing on the town website.

During this past year, Police reported that vehicular traffic was busier than usual for the summer period. Inconsiderate behavior was especially noted among motorists resulting in many resident complaints of speeding and parking problems. These were investigated and resolved to the best of the town's ability within personnel and budgetary restrictions. The committee is alarmed at the amount of speeding complaints that have been brought to our attention and is working closely with the Police representatives to address the problem. Grants received by the Police have allowed them to purchase additional equipment that registers speed on town streets. In addition, a policy is being drafted to address the possibility of both town and private groups to purchase solar speed signs for neighborhoods.

Construction on Route 28 through Dennis Port village has been completed and plans for phase 2 in West Dennis has been moved to 2026. The bike path crossings on old Main Street was repaired. Covid 19 restrictions were uplifted in June and in person meetings have resumed once again and the sidewalk plan can be viewed in person. Elements of that plan are still being completed. There have been over 10 miles of renovated and newly constructed sidewalks completed over this period. A town policy for recommending construction of new crosswalks is being studied for implementation in the next year. Two speed studies were done, one on Depot Street (Upper County to Great Western) where flashing speed signs were placed, and the second for the Quivet Neck Association to drop speed in that area from 30 to 25, which is in the hands of the Select Board for approval and some signage like walk left/ride right be posted in the same area.

We want to thank, Bob Surette and Tom Huetter for their years of service and advice to the Road Safety Task Force committee over the years. We are welcoming, Les Czerepak and Heather Peters to the committee in 2021.

During this trying period of living activities within strict health guidelines, the committee wishes to thank the Police, DPW and Engineering departments for their cooperation and assistance in alerting the citizens, both permanent and visiting, to practice road safety awareness. We continue to encourage citizens to bring any road concerns to our attention to ensure the safety of our communities.

SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING COMMITTEE

The Solid Waste and Recycling Committee (SWRC) spent 2021 following the construction work that was going on with the renovation and enhancement of the transfer station. The key items for the project were to improve traffic flow, increase recycling capacity, re-arrange the plant to make it easier for staff to manage, meet the changing needs of the co-ed staff in non-public areas and to improve overall safety. This project continued with success in spite of the Covid pandemic. The new scale house location allowed for better access to the recycling area and viewing of entering traffic. The storage/maintenance building and the new co-ed staff building was opened and the staff parking area was renovated with new asphalt. The Committee wants to also thank its users for their patience during construction. The project was winding down in late 2021.

Staffing shortages impacted the entire region and the transfer station felt the impact directly. With a severe lack of summer time employees, the Transfer Station reduced opening from five days instead of seven. Staffing could remain a concern for the summer of 2022.

For 2023 the Committee will be looking to make sure that the financial aspects of the Transfer Station operations are appropriately funded to ensure the success of the operation.

The regional glass depot was active this last year. The depot received approximately 2,000 tons of glass over the past two years. This year the existing glass that had been collected and crushed in 2019 was lab tested for usability for drainage in municipal projects in the area. After passing the tests, local municipalities started using the crushed glass in school building projects and for sewer line drainage. The first thousand tons were used by the end of the year. A crush of the 2,000 tons was performed on the uncrushed glass and will be used very quickly on more projects in the area.

The SWRC welcomes you to attend our meetings to suggest improvements and bring concerns you may have regarding the transfer station and recycling in the town of Dennis. Please be sure to check the Dennis Town Website for meeting times.

NATURAL RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

The Natural Resources Department includes the Director, Shellfish Constable, Conservation Agent, Land Management Specialist and Principal Office Assistants. Each employee also acts as a Natural Resource Officer and in addition to performing their primary job duties, is also responsible for patrolling the Town Conservation Lands and barrier beaches, responding to calls for assistance with nuisance wildlife, and investigating reports of whale, seal and turtle strandings. The staff also provides input on Wetland Protection Act permit applications, building permit applications and rezoning proposals. The Department provides support for the Conservation Commission, Agriculture Commission, Shellfish Committee, Water Quality Advisory Committee and Beach Management Advisory Task Force. Despite lacking a Principal Office Assistant and Land Management Specialist for the last 5 months of 2020 and the first 4 months of 2021, the Department continued to perform all these tasks.

The Department continues to oversee activities at the community gardens on Route 6A, Fisk Street and at Seaview Park as well as managing the two Town blueberry patches in Dennis Village and West Dennis. Both venues remain very popular with the residents.

The Department hired a great crew of seasonal staff for 2021. They assisted with piping plover monitoring and also enforcement of the ORV Beach Regulations at Chapin Beach and Crowe's Pasture Beach. Despite a closure for piping plover chicks, ORV use of Crowes Pasture was busy when it was open. Access to The Point was restricted due to erosion and had to be permanently closed in late August due to staffing shortages. Erosion continues to be a problem and limits available ORV access. A revenue of \$128,550 was made from the sale of ORV permits this past year. We received several complaints from staff regarding unruly, harassing and bullying behavior from the public. Staff issued a total of 19 citations with approximately \$800 of revenue. Three citations have been revised to criminal complaints due to lack of payment/court appearance.

Nesting piping plovers affected West Dennis Beach once again. In 2021, there were 8 nests on the beach. Several were within the protective setback established by the MassWildlife permit we received to protect piping plovers. A vehicle escort plan was instituted temporarily to allow the parking lot to remain partially open. This plan was halted in late June due to additional nest hatchings combined with a lack of staffing. With additional staffing approved for 2022, we anticipate keeping the lot open for a full summer.

Department staff again collected water samples during July and August in Bass River, Chase Garden Creek and Sesuit Creek. Sample test results are used as part of the DEP Estuaries Study.

Shellfish

Crowes Pasture commercial aquaculture grants remain full and the Town continued its efforts to make sure everyone is compliant with State and Local regulations. Changes to the Commercial Aquaculture shellfish regulations were approved by Committee and the Select Board, enabling staff to revise the waiting list procedures and operations of the commercial aquaculture oyster grants at Crowes Pasture.

Staff completed the planting of remote set oysters behind West Dennis Beach in Old Field Bend, plus raising quahog and soft shell seed in our upweller on the Bass River. Additionally, under a special permit issued by the Division of Marine Fisheries quahogs were relayed from Fall River to Grand Cove for Recreational Shellfishing. The new Upwellers have been purchased and will be installed and operational for this coming summer to grow Quahog and Oyster seed.

Land Management

The blueberry patches were open in the summer for picking by town residents, and remain popular. As in 2020, no fee was charged for harvesting blueberries.

Herring run counts were conducted by DNR staff. There are two active herring runs in Dennis: Scargo Lake to Sesuit Harbor, and Bound Brook to Quivett Creek. Town staff have been working with MaDOT to upgrade the culverts within the Scargo Lake herring run.

The Department web page continues to be updated to reflect the various departmental duties and provide access to permit application forms and rules and regulations. Our Americorps volunteer is working with staff to develop new trail maps which will be easily accessible online.

The Department remains committed to our mission of protecting, managing and enhancing the Town of Dennis natural resources. We look forward to working with the community to develop a town-wide trail system which provides access to and showcases these natural resources.

A big Thank You to the staff who did such a great job this year despite all the reduced staff.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission is an appointed board, tasked with administering the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act and the Dennis Wetlands Bylaw to ensure the protection of wetland resources and their essential functions within the Town of Dennis. The Commission, in conjunction with the Department of Natural Resources, also manages over 80 conservation areas in town.

The Commission hearings, posted at the Dennis Town Offices, are held at 6:00 p.m. on the first and third Thursday of each month. In 2021, the Commission held twenty-four regular hearings under both the State and Local Wetlands Protection Laws. Throughout 2021, the Commission conducted meetings via Zoom, in person, and a combination of both. They never failed to have a meeting despite the COVID restrictions, making sure permit applications were processed expeditiously.

During 2021, the Commission reviewed and acted upon 59 Notice of Intent applications, 58 Requests for Determination of Applicability, 5 requests for Amended Order of Conditions, 49 Certificate of Compliance requests, 7 Enforcement Actions and numerous administrative or other reviews.

Unfortunately, 2021 saw the resignation of long-serving member Walter von Hone. The Commission also lost Craig Short. Their knowledge and dedication will surely be missed.

SHELLFISH COMMITTEE

Commercial shell fishing has since rebounded from 2020. With restaurants being able to open up full time this past summer, the price and demand of shellfish increased compared to 2020.

Recreational

Quahog harvesting numbers have gone up this year compared to last year; approximately 500 pecks of Quahogs were harvested from our Quahog family area off of Cove Road, as compared to 450 pecks from the prior year. Approximately 200 pecks of Oysters were harvested from our family area behind West Dennis Beach, with the same number of pecks from the previous year. We lost one of our quahog suppliers in 2020 so our purchase of quahogs has decreased.

Propagation

As a result of COVID, we did not receive any matching State funds for the propagation grant we typically receive through the county; each Cape town received less than the normal amount of funding. Due to this decrease in our budget, we adjusted some of our seed purchases. 200,000 quahogs were purchased for seeding throughout the Bass River, 70 bushels of Quahogs were relayed from Fall River and transplanted to the family areas of Grand Cove and 40,000 oyster seeds and 50 bags of remote set oysters were purchased to propagate the Bass River.

We have been notified that the funds have been matched for this upcoming 2022 year, so we will ramp up our propagation for the next season.

The new Up-Wellers have been purchased and will be installed and operational for this coming summer to grow Quahog and Oyster seed.

The Committee was able to start have meetings this year, we started with a few zoom meetings in the spring time and were able to go to in person meetings in the fall. Changes to the Aquaculture regulations were approved by Committee and the Select Board, enabling staff to revise the waiting list procedures and operations of the aquaculture grants at Crowes Pasture.

We regretfully said goodbye to our Chairman Glenn Morrell, as he stepped down from his position in November. We wish Glenn good luck and we thank him for his years of service. We welcome Aaron Brochu as our new Chairman, he was nominated by the Committee at the December meeting.

BARNSTABLE COUNTY COASTAL RESOURCES SUBCOMMITTEE

The BCCRS is a technical subcommittee of the Barnstable County Coastal Management Committee, (BCCMC) with a representative from each of the 15 Cape Cod Towns. These representatives are nominated by the Selectmen or the Town Council in Barnstable, a representative of the Mass Bays National Estuary Program Service Provider, and 2 members are nominated by the BCCMC Board. All appointed by the County Commissioners to provide input on local coastal resource issues.

This Committee meets quarterly. The BCCMC focus remains on the implementation of the Cape Cod Water Resources Restoration Projects and urging Washington to support continued funding for the Small Watersheds Program of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service's (NRCS). These programs restore shellfish habitat by improving water quality, restoring fish passages and improving water quality to restore salt marshes for habitat.

GOLF DEPARTMENT

Just like 2020, 2021 started out filled with COVID protocols due to the global pandemic. Golf remained one of the few activities that people could participate in that remained relatively safe. Due to another mild winter, the Golf Department witnessed record numbers of rounds in the months of January, February and March.

While adapting to the ever changing restrictions, the Golf Department managed to stay in operation the entire year without closures due to COVID. We took steps to ensure the safety of the patrons, as well as the staff, including temperature and symptom monitoring, increased frequency in cleaning and implementing those protocols set forth by the State. By the end of the fiscal year, 2021, the Golf Department recorded a record year for revenue, turning back an additional \$1,000,000.00 than originally anticipated thanks to an increase in membership and record rounds played by guests. The total number of memberships for 2021 topped 1800; yet the Department managed to return some of the programs it had temporarily cut due to COVID, including, although reduced, league play and early back nine hole play at both golf courses.

2021 was not without its other challenges: drought, shortage of staff and supplies. The groundscrew had to reduce the amount of water used as per the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection and the Water Management Act. The lack of rainfall executed the Department's plan of action for water reduction. And once again, as in seasons prior, the Department was plagued by a lack of seasonal help in the maintenance department- putting a higher demand on those that were willing to work. It is through the tremendous effort of the maintenance department Superintendents, George Fairbanks and Brian Campbell and their staff in keeping the grounds in tremendous shape, despite the water restrictions and increase in play.

I would like to take the opportunity to praise the Full-Time and Part-Time Staff for their dedication and hard work in seeing through another difficult and demanding year. I appreciate their efforts and look forward to another successful year in 2022.

BEACH MANAGEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

BMAC is comprised of seven residents and registered voters representing the Select Board (one), Beach Committee (two), Conservation Committee (one), and three (3) members-at-large, appointed by the Select Board, and with invaluable support from Karen Johnson, Director of Natural Resources and Dustin Pineau, Director of Beaches and Recreation. We are charged with monitoring fresh and saltwater shorelines throughout the town, identifying potential issues related to ongoing erosion, access and activities that impact the natural resource areas.

Committee meetings resumed remotely in 2021, using Zoom, and in person meetings are happening once again.

The committee continues to work on the Dr. Bottero project, researching possible resolutions to the erosion problem in the area. The Select Board and others have been actively participating in meetings to assist the Board in making a decision on the best plan for the area.

After receiving our permit to implement a plover escort plan at West Dennis Beach in 2020, we were unable to carry out the program due to Covid19 restrictions, but did implement the program on a limited basis in 2021. Additional seasonal staff has been requested for the 2022 beach season to escort cars beyond the traffic barriers at West Dennis Beach during the plover nesting season. This allows us flexibility in offering better access to Bass River and enabling beach and recreational activities, by many user groups, to continue with minimal inconvenience to our residents and seasonal guests.

Our members would also like to thank the many Town Departments that assist Natural Resources and Beaches in successfully executing their mission. None of us would be able to fulfill our charge from the Select Board, the stewards of our natural resource areas, without the dedicated and professional help from the entire team.

As your Harbormaster, it is my pleasure to provide you with the following report for 2021. Noteworthy accomplishments for the year were many and included but were not limited to the following:

- The Select Board appointed five (5) residents of the Town to a Sesuit Harbor Design and Building Committee. This Committee is charged with assisting in the development of construction-ready design plans and obtaining of required permits to implement improvements to the upland portion of the west side of Sesuit Harbor. In order to fund this project, the Harbormaster Department secured a financial grant from the Seaport Economic Council in the amount of \$350,000. The Town subsequently engaged the services of Catalyst Architecture to prepare designs and obtain permits for this project. Design work will likely continue into 2022.
- 2021 marked year three of the Town's Automated Parking Kiosk program at Sesuit Harbor. A third unit was installed to make the program more convenient for harbor users.
- Construction and installation of a new main dock on the east side of Sesuit Harbor and numerous feeder and finger docks on the east and west sides of Sesuit Harbor.
- Maintenance dredging of the Sesuit entrance channel.

I would like to extend my sincerest thanks and appreciation to my assistant, Deputy Bill McKenzie, my office manager, Joanne Iachetta, and my seasonal and year-round part-time staff for their hard work and commendable performances. I wish to also extend my gratitude to the Department of Public Works, the Fire Department and the Police Department for their support and assistance. On a personal note, we wish Fire Chief Mark Dellner fair winds and following seas in his retirement. Congrats, Mark!

RECREATION COMMISSION

In spite of the ongoing Covid pandemic, our Recreation Department, under the leadership of Dustin Pineau, with Gerrit Murphy as Program Coordinator, had another banner year for recreation activities. We enjoyed a significant 39% increase in participation this year over an already successful 2020 year. Summer camp welcomed its highest participation ever with over 1000 registrations over 9 sessions. Our adult offerings included a successful pickleball program, as well as softball groups, kickball, soccer, cornhole, basketball, street hockey, baseball, football, yoga, pilates, and other wellness and instructional programs. Our youth tennis and sailing were at capacity. The 43rd Annual Road Race returned with over 300 runners and our 8th annual Youth Street Hockey program matched up successfully against the Police Dept.

The year was very busy for the Commission as it continues to seek additional recreational and arts programs and venues to broaden the activities available for all Dennis residents. The existing sub-committee for pursuing a new activities building was active all year. We hope to see a feasibility study in the forthcoming annual town meeting for a recreation building. Our charge was updated to reflect the challenges of finding active school age members, and allowing for a new regular member of the Commission. A survey was conducted, with over 300 respondents commenting on all recreation facilities, programs, and potential new concepts. A summary is posted on the Recreation Town website. Further action will be forthcoming regarding the survey results. Partnering with the Community Preservation Committee provided taxpayer support for the access improvement to playground surfaces at Mike Stacy and Sea View Parks. Much needed sunshades were erected at Johnny Kelley Park, Wixon Courts and Sea View Park using Community Preservation funds. A new sub-committee was established to plan and execute a renovation of Johnny Kelley Park. This location is the hub for most town recreation activities and is heavily used on a daily basis. It needs to be refurbished. This sub-committee is tasked with presenting to the Select Board a plan for execution.

The Commission would like to thank the Department of Public Works for their continuing assistance in maintaining our parks. None of these programs and improvements would be possible without the full support of town residents. The Recreation Commission thanks the town for this support and will continue its commitment to providing a well-balanced and exciting recreational agenda.

COUNCIL ON AGING | DENNIS SENIOR CENTER (DSC)

The Dennis Senior Center (DSC) community welcomed 2021 still in the grips of Covid19. Council on Aging board (COA) monthly meetings were held via tele-conference calls, and our first in-person meeting, in over a year, took place in June. DSC staff continued to provide essential services to persons in need of food, transportation, and assistance with vaccine registration and administration, through collaborative efforts with the Dennis Health and Fire Depts.

Despite the challenges posed by the pandemic, including staff shortages, the Cranberry Scoop (the newsletter of the Dennis Senior Center), with help from the Scoop Mailing Team volunteers, went out to 2300 residents who continued to receive news and information from the DSC in the mail.

The Supporters of the Dennis Council on Aging (SDCOA) secured generous donations of furnishings and equipment for the new wing, later renamed, the Dennis Center for Active Living, or DCAL, for short. Most of these items will be installed after the renovation of the original building begins next May. SDCOA also purchased a Versa Trainer system and The Mirror, a digital fitness coach, for the fitness studios at the DCAL. We thank them for their continued support.

In 2021 the DSC was restored as a voting precinct (#2) for the town, and with the installation of a new generator, as a warming/cooling shelter, for residents of the Town.

Long-time COA Board Chairman, Arthur Crooks, Esq, passed away in September. He specialized in Elder Law and kept the Board updated on developments in that field. He will be sorely missed. Throughout the year, the Outreach Department's Brown Bag and Mobile Food Pantry programs provided seniors and needy families a monthly bag of groceries. The DSC also opened its own Village Food Pantry with support from the Massachusetts Councils on Aging. Home delivery was provided by the DSC to those unable to pick up in person. Bridging the Gap, a pilot program for dementia patients and their caregivers, was held during the summer and continues to operate as a respite care program at the DCAL. The pilot program was funded through a grant from the Massachusetts Councils on Aging. Construction of the new 10,000 square foot wing culminated in a grand opening event on October 19. Over 325 guests attended and toured the expanded facility, including Town department heads, administrators and elected officials. We look forward to new and existing programs returning to the DCAL in 2022.

Many thanks to the **COA Board, Supporters of Dennis Council on Aging**, and the Friends of Dennis Senior Citizens for their continued service to the Senior Center and the senior citizens of Dennis and their families. Lastly, we missed seeing our over 100 registered volunteers for most of 2021 while they still managed to help out in many ways. We all look forward to a grand reunion next year!

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON DISABILITIES

After meeting by conference call for most of the year, the Advisory Committee on Disabilities (ACD) resumed in-person meetings in September 2021. At that time, three new members were welcomed to the committee and began contributing new insights and fresh ideas.

During the year conversations were initiated with the Police and Fire/Rescue Departments regarding the Town's Emergency Preparedness Plan and how the ACD might assist in helping residents with disabilities to complete a Disability Indicator Form. This form identifies individuals with specific needs who may need special help during an emergency.

The ACD also coordinated with the Town Clerk's Office to produce an informational flier to be included in the January 2022 town census mailing. This flier encourages residents to get to know the responsibilities and activities of the ACD and how to contact for assistance. As part of this effort to increase access, residents can now call the ACD at a new designated extension of the COA/DCAL general phone number.

In November, the ACD invited town staff and other interested parties to join the committee for a January 2022 presentation by Cape Organization for Rights of the Disabled (CORD) about their mission and services.

In December, the ACD welcomed a representative from Independence House who discussed the receipt of a recent grant which will enhance their ability to address the prevention of sexual and physical violence in the disability community. It was agreed that the ACD and Independence House will partner in future educational activities.

At the end of the fiscal year, the ACD agreed to use the bulk of their annual budget to fund the purchase of an accessible water bottle filler to be installed at the Johnny Kelly Park.

With the return to near normal activities in 2022, the Advisory Committee on Disabilities looks forward to increasing its outreach and assistance.

DENNIS HOUSING AUTHORITY

On behalf of the Board of Commissioners and Staff, we respectfully submit to you the Annual Report for the Dennis Housing Authority.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Dennis Housing Authority Board of Commissioners is posted at the Dennis Town Hall and normally meets the third Monday of the month at 5:15 p.m. at 167 Center Street, South Dennis.

With the start of a new year, we began 2021 happy to put 2020 behind us for a fresh start after nearly a year long journey navigating through the pandemic. As the year progressed, we did get a bit closer to a “new normal”. We continued to service our tenants and prospective tenants while carrying on business as usual with added safety precautions in place.

In March of 2021 we held three successful onsite COVID Vaccine Clinics at each of our Elderly Disabled properties. With the much-appreciated collaboration of The Dennis Board of Health and Dennis Fire Department we were able to vaccinate many residents and staff.

In May we welcomed Robert Mezzadri to the Board of Commissioners.

We completed multiple large Capital Projects: new roofs, gutters/downspouts, and Septic Systems at our scattered family sites. A new Laundry Room at an Elderly site, and a new staff restroom in the office. Smaller projects consisted of kitchen cabinets/counters at our DMH property and updated heat detectors at elderly sites.

It was another year of extraordinary unit turnover in 2021 keeping us very busy rehabbing the vacated units and making upgrades. Three family units were updated with all new kitchen cabinets and counters during this time.

The Board of Commissioners and staff continue to work diligently to provide well-run management operations, financial stability, resident satisfaction, and upkeep of their properties to provide affordable, decent, safe, and sanitary housing in Dennis. The Housing Authority appreciates the support received from the town throughout the year. Through this collaborative effort and in partnership with various city, state and federal agencies, the Dennis Housing Authority will find new and innovative ways of providing affordable housing in Dennis.

VETERANS SERVICES

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Dennis:

The following report is of the activities of the Department of Veterans' Services for Calendar Year 2021. Our duties are categorized in two basic areas: Benefits and Services.

Commonwealth Low-income Benefits:

This program is covered and authorized under Massachusetts General Law Chapter 115. It provides financial assistance to honorably discharged veterans and their dependents who establish need and worthiness and are residents of the Town of Dennis. During FY 2021, the Town, through our office, extended benefits to qualified veterans totaling \$138,805.93 for housing, food, heat, medical and other related costs. The amount expended was reimbursed to the Town by the Commonwealth at a rate of 75% of total expenditures.

Federal Benefits and Services:

We assisted veterans and their dependents in obtaining federal, state and local benefits under the broad umbrella of the Department of Veterans Affairs. These services included payments for service-connected disabilities, pensions, education, medical, burial, medals and records. In 2021, this office assisted in obtaining \$4,567,477.68 in cash payments for service-connected injury compensation and for non-service-connected tax-free disability pensions for Dennis veterans and their dependents. These alternative sources of income are at no cost to the Town and greatly reduce the need for the MGL Chapter 115 benefits noted above.

We encourage any veteran or dependent of a veteran to contact us at 1-508-778-8740 Monday through Friday from 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM. We can also schedule appointments in our Harwich office, at your home or any location that is best for you. We are open for business by appointment during COVID. Please call ahead.

We extend our thanks to the Board of Selectmen, the Town Administrator and Town Accountant for their outstanding support throughout the year as well as to the residents of the town who voted overwhelmingly to establish a Veteran's Home in Dennis. The first of its kind on the Cape.

CARETAKERS OF VETERAN'S GRAVES

The Caretakers of Veteran's Graves committees' mission is to ensure the placement of new United States flags in a place of honor on the upper right of our deceased veterans' graves in the cemeteries in the Town of Dennis. The Town provides over 1,300 flags and the 8-member committee coordinates and places the flags before Memorial Day and also oversees their proper condition throughout the year. The basic duties of the committee are:

1. Make every effort to ensure that each veteran's grave has an appropriate marker and new United States flag before Memorial Day.
2. Oversee the condition of flags and markers during the course of the year, including Veterans Day in all 6 active and 4 inactive cemeteries in Dennis where veterans are known to be buried.
3. Individual committee members are each assigned a particular cemetery to keep properly flagged and ensure that markers are functional and in place. Wind storms and harsh winter weather can cause the replacement of lost or damaged flags by committee members.

At Merrill Memorial Park and its grounds, Caretakers were also responsible for seeing that the 3-armed service flags there continued to be maintained in a proper condition and raised before Memorial Day and after Veterans Day.

The committee members, assisted by a variety of other volunteers placed the flags during the month of May in order to have them flying with honor and pride on Memorial Day.

We are especially thankful to the Town of Dennis, the Department of Public Works and in particular, Cemetery Coordinator, Rebecca Smith, along with David Johansen and Michelle Sands for their efforts.

DENNIS ARTS AND CULTURE COUNCIL

Faced with challenges to gatherings posed by the COVID pandemic, in 2021 the Dennis Arts and Culture Council continued its outreach attempts to obtain community input through interest cards left at town libraries, coffee houses, and art galleries. The cards ask Dennis residents to prioritize what types of art and cultural events the council should support with state funding; the survey was also posted on the Facebook page for the Arts and Culture Council. Thus far, responses lean heavily to support of craft festivals, live music, and theatrical performances.

Funding for FY2022 was granted to a variety of events and efforts, including musical and dance performances on the beach and at the Senior Center, school vacation art and entertainment events, classes in learning the ukulele, using a printing press, and in acting (including stage combat), summer concerts on the Dennis Village green and chamber music performances. The council's aim is to provide something for every age group in the Town of Dennis with events that will reach the most people.

Membership in the council also expanded in 2021, with the inclusion of residents Jane Cancellieri and Roger Shoemaker. They join Lisa Valkenier, Emily Entwisle, Vana Trudeau, David Kaplan, and Kate Martin.

COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

Do you wish we could make Dennis an even better place to live? More open space, better parks, playgrounds, and more workforce housing?

Did you know there is money, waiting to be spent, that doesn't increase your taxes?

Did you know more than 60% of this money is from State matching funds?

All you have to do is say: "Yes, I want Dennis to be a better place to live and work," and then vote to support Community Preservation projects at Town Meeting.

Under the Community Preservation Act, adopted by Dennis voters in 2005, funding is derived from Town and matching State sources, and allocated yearly to a separate fund for use only on community projects. The law requires these funds be reserved for affordable housing, historical preservation, open space, and recreation.

The funding of the current Community Preservation budget was approved at the 2021 Annual Town meeting for a total of \$1,731,771. Funds not spent stay in the account.

Individuals and organizations, for profit and not-for-profit, are eligible to apply for these funds every year in May. Please see: <https://www.town.dennis.ma.us/community-preservation-committee>.

Our committee, made up of Town residents, is charged with allocating these funds to projects that most contribute to the public good. We often have more applications than funding available, so the committee is challenged to decide which will be recommended. We usually meet on the second and fourth Thursday of the month. The public is encouraged to attend.

After extensive review, the recommended projects make their way through the Town Article process for vote at the fall Special Town Meeting.

SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Dennis Substance Use Advisory Council was created in 2019 with the charge to, “advocate for a healthy community by promoting best practices for the prevention, intervention and treatment of alcohol, tobacco, opioid and other substance use disorders”. SUDAC has representatives from Dennis Police, Fire and other town departments. Research into substance use disorders has highlighted the fact that addiction is a complex brain disorder with behavioral components. We recognize that the public, even many in health care and the justice system continue to view addiction as a result of moral weakness and flawed character. This has the effect of continuing the cycle of substance use and keeps individuals and their families from seeking help. SUDAC recognizes that the mission includes activities aimed at removing the stigma of substance use disorders. SUDAC has the goal of supporting community efforts in education and harm reduction from substances.

Neilsen reported a 54% increase in national sales of alcohol for the week ending March 21,2020 compared with one year before; online sales increased 262% from 2019. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as of June 2020 reported 13% of Americans reported starting or increasing substance use to cope with stress and emotions due to COVID-19.

The prevalence of Fentanyl has contributed to an acceleration of cases of overdoses and deaths. SUDAC voted to continue the Recovery Support Navigator Program in conjunction with Duffy Health Center. The RSN offers support to individuals in accessing treatment services and community resources. The Dennis Police Department is the source of referrals to the RSN. Since the beginning of the RSN grant 205 individuals have been referred to the program. The RSN has been having open office hours at the Dennis Public Library in the effort to increase visibility and engagement. The SUDAC thanks the Dennis Public Library for their support.

The SUDAC has had presentations consistent with the mission of decreasing stigma, prevention, treatment and recovery from substance use disorders. The “Words Matter Pledge” developed at Boston Medical Center was reviewed. We met with Paul Dart of *Pauseawhile* and learned about the pivot to remote meetings that local AA groups have made during COVID-19.

The Aids Support Group of Cape Cod presented on their excellent array of services directed at overdose prevention as well as referrals to medical and recovery supports. There are current vacancies on the committee and the SUDAC invites additional community members to apply for membership.

DENNIS HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Dennis Historical Commission serves to protect, develop and promote the history of Dennis and its historic archaeological assets. Our priority is to preserve endangered significant structures in Dennis. We are appointed by the Select Board and adhere to Massachusetts General Laws that govern local historical commissions.

In 2021, the Dennis Historical Commission held twelve meetings. Five of them were zoom meetings as alternative public access. Five demolition applications, for structures built before 1946, were reviewed and approved without initiating the demolition delay bylaw. A second alternate member, was appointed to our commission.


An archaeological reconnaissance survey along Bass River was completed by Gray & Pape Heritage Management, Daniel Zoto principal archaeologist. A Dennis Historic Resource Survey and Inventory has begun under the Public Archaeology Survey Team, Inc., James Sexton historical architect. These projects are funded by the Community Preservation Act and we sincerely appreciate this dedication to the historic preservation.

Burton N. Derick Historic Preservation Awards were presented to four homeowners, outdoors on Colonial Day at the Josiah Dennis Manse. We have adopted a master plan for the commission and collaborated with local preservation advocacy groups. We are currently designing an interpretive sign for Scargo Tower.

Preservation is always a compromise. It is a blend of restoration, stabilization, rehabilitation, renovation, replication and documentation. We preserve buildings and structures. Through their architecture, the history and heritage of Dennis lives on.

Our meetings are usually held on the first Monday of the month at 4 pm in the Dennis Town Hall. Please check the Town of Dennis Website for a current schedule. The public, whose input is a valuable resource for our town's history, is always welcome.

OLD KING'S HIGHWAY REGIONAL HISTORIC DISTRICT

The Old King's Highway Historic district is the largest contiguous Historic District in the country. It encompasses all of the land area between Route 6 (the Mid-Cape Highway) and Cape Cod Bay, from the towns of Sandwich to Orleans. Each of the six towns in the district are represented by a local board; with the regional committee consisting of the chair person. Of each town committee in existence, the goal is to hear any appeals to local decisions. The members of the board consist of Kimery Holl, James Pazakis, Nate Salley, Justine Copenrath and Bill Bohlin (Chair). Phil Catchings is the alternate member who serves upon the absence of any member at a meeting. The board members put in long hours, as they must visit every site prior to the meeting in order to familiarize themselves with the application and determine if it meets the requirements of the act. And they also participate in bi-monthly meetings. Applications for such projects as new construction, additions, fencing, paint colors, and solar panels make up the highest percentage of applications.

The year 2021 was, to say the least, a bit of a challenge. With the Covid 19 epidemic, our meetings went virtual, which meant that all applicants had to appear via Zoom meeting. The committee had 22 scheduled meetings and heard a total of 273 applications. Although the process of Zoom meetings started off with an expected learning curve, most applicants learned quick, and our meeting continued at a good pace.

I would like to thank all of the members of the board for their hard work and their dedication. They should be thanked by the entire town for their efforts to keep the district the beautiful place that it is.

LIBRARY DEPARTMENT

The Dennis Library System is comprised of the Town operated Dennis Public Library and the four privately operated village libraries of Dennis Memorial Library, Jacob Sears Memorial Library, South Dennis Library, and West Dennis Library. The directors of the five libraries meet regularly and coordinate efforts to best serve the community. The libraries are guided by our mission statement: "The Dennis Libraries strive to provide current information, titles, and technology in welcoming settings and diverse programs that offer affordable learning opportunities and foster multi-generational community interaction."

Each Dennis library offers a variety of services and resources, some unique to individual libraries. We have public computers, printers, and WIFI access; reference and information; programming for all ages; databases for research and readers' advisory; electronically downloadable materials; museum passes; English as a second language instruction; technology instruction; community meeting rooms; low vision equipment; homebound delivery; the Cape Cod Genealogical Society Research Room; and the Dennis Historical Society's Pauline (Wixon) Derick Library.

During the beginning of 2021, while still under pandemic restrictions, the Dennis Libraries continued to provide patrons with library materials by offering curbside pickup services and remote access to electronic resources. To encourage outdoor activities for readers of all ages, we installed winter, spring, and summer StoryWalks® at Johnny Kelley Park. Our work with Dennis schools continued. Not only did we provide library cards to new students at the Ezra H. Baker Innovation School, but we also facilitated partnerships between OverDrive, the Mattacheese Middle School, and the D-Y Regional High School. Now students can access digital materials available through CLAMS using their school IDs and OverDrive's Sora app. Finally, joining efforts, the Dennis Libraries coordinated the resumption of in-person services in June. Although some hours had to be adjusted and some health guidelines instituted, welcoming patrons back into our buildings was a very happy event. We look forward to a return to even more normalcy in 2022.

REPORTS FROM DIRECTORS:

Adaptation was the key in 2021 as Dennis Public Library transitioned from a building closed to the public to opening its doors. We wanted to provide our traditional services, but there were some new twists. Weekly storytimes happened outside, and more programs went virtual. To support a healthier indoor environment, we purchased air purifiers using funds from the Massachusetts State Aid to Public Libraries Program. Groups that met in the Benjamin and Ruth Muse Meeting Room were invited to return in the fall, and we had our first art show since the pandemic began. Displaying artist Suzanna Nickerson invited patrons to bring in their own artwork to highlight the issue of plastic beach trash. A Recovery Support Navigator from the Duffy Health Center offered guidance in our meeting room one day a week. We also collaborated on StoryWalks® with our partners, the Dennis Conservation Land Trust and the Dennis-Yarmouth Family

& Community Engagement Program. We thank all of our supporters – patrons, volunteers, and Friends - who helped us through this past year. In 2022, working with the other Dennis libraries, we will continue to explore ways to benefit and serve the community.

2021 was a year of COVID recovery for the Dennis Memorial Library. We returned to a near normal schedule, allowed limited public meetings and programs, and welcomed back our in-person patrons. We continued to offer our popular curbside service as well and home delivery for the homebound. Because the Dennis Libraries and the Library Board were not allowed to do our Little Libraries by the Sea program this year, we gave away the over 6000 books, DVDs, puzzles, games etc. that we had set aside for this purpose by putting these materials on our porch for our patrons to take free of charge. It was a huge success. We retrained our staff, many of whom hadn't used a CLAMS computer or served patrons in over a year, with a week-long very intensive program. We reevaluated and revised many of our services to keep up with technology and patron needs. It was a good year and a productive one. We look forward to a full schedule of hours, programs and services beginning in January 2022.

The Jacob Sears Memorial Library celebrated the anniversary of its 125th year of serving the community with a birthday party and celebration on July 4th, the anniversary of its opening. We were happy to be welcoming not only our regular patrons, but also new patrons and visitors to our beautiful building again. When the Dennis Libraries reopened in June we were able to see and talk with them for the first time in many months. During this time, we continued to purchase and make materials available to all our patrons. We tried to make access to these materials as easy and convenient as possible through curbside pickup, and grab and go inside pickup as soon as we were able to do so. We will continue to do our best to provide our patrons with materials in the easiest, most convenient manner possible. We are looking forward to 2022 with the hope that we will continue to be able to fulfill the wishes of our founder, Jacob Sears, by providing facilities, materials, and services to not only our patrons, but to the Town of Dennis and its many visitors in a more normal manner. We are very proud to be a part of the Dennis Library System and its service to all our residents

2021 was a great year for the South Dennis Library. During the first half of the year, we continued offering remote services online and through curbside pickup. We provided personalized book and DVD bundles for patrons, both young and old; we gave out craft kits to keep the little ones entertained at home and continued to make help available for people stuck at home due to COVID-19. In June, we were happy to welcome our patrons back inside the building! We kicked off our summer with a Children's Reading Program that included lots of screen-free activities like Storytime, outdoor challenges, scavenger hunts, and StoryWalks®. In the fall, we offered outdoor Storytime for toddlers and a Baby Lapsit program for babies and their caregivers. We continue to tailor our collections to the needs of our community: we have added new titles to our Juvenile Mental Health Collection and a new STEM/Activity Kit section for children. We are incredibly grateful for our staff, volunteers, and patrons, who transform our little library into an enormous fountain of inspiration for learning and fun.

Like other libraries, the COVID-19 pandemic has forced the West Dennis Library to adjust, adapt, and reevaluate our services in order to meet our community's informational, educational, and entertainment needs in new and different ways. Between January and June 2021, our Library focused on offering an array of services that could be accessed remotely and/or safely from home, including curbside pickup (available four days per week, including Sundays), browsing and reference services by telephone, eBooks and eAudiobooks through Overdrive, curbside printing & faxing, an outdoor Pop-Up Book Sale, and 24-hour Wi-Fi available from our parking lot. In mid-June, we were able to reopen our building to the public with new safety precautions in place and began hosting small in-person programs in our Program Room in July. The highlight of our year was our 101st Birthday Celebration in August, which brought the community together again in a way we hadn't experienced since the pandemic began.

On October 8, 2021 in our current school year, we finally, under the constraints of COVID protocols, held a restricted invitee ribbon cutting event for the community. I do think you would have been proud of our students who were front and center at this event. Your forethought to support construction of their school will benefit current and future technical students for decades to come. Finally, we not only view our facility as a school but as a community resource providing services to towns and community members, offering afternoon and evening workforce training, and hosting events for town and local organizations. Thank you, again.



Town of Dennis: Dennis had 73 students enrolled at Cape Cod Tech as of October 1, 2020.

The assessment for Dennis in FY21 was **\$1,483,660**, based on **73** students on October 1, 2019.

Assessments are based on the previous year's enrollment.

Highlights from Cape Cod Tech 2020-21 School Year

- Graduated 127 seniors: 16 from Dennis.
- Enrolled 174 freshman: 23 from Dennis.
- The student newspaper *Tech Talk* won numerous prestigious awards this year: a gold medal from Columbia Scholastic Press Association, the Highest Achievement Award from New England Press Association, multiple awards from the Youth Journalism International competition and first Place with Special Merit from the American Scholastic Association.
- Through the generosity of Cape Cod community organizations, charities and family memorials, Cape Cod Tech presented 38 toolships and 46 scholarships to the graduating class of 2021 for a total of \$84,766.
- Thirty-four (34) students received John and Abigail Adams Scholarships; three from Dennis.
- *SkillsUSA* is a national student organization and is a huge part of the of the Cape Cod Tech experience combining technical, academic and employability skills. Forty-two (42) students participated in competitions winning 19 District medals and 14 state medals. Cape Cod Tech was recognized as a National Model of Excellence.
- Future Farmers of America, "FFA" is a national career and technical student organization based on middle and high school classes that promote and support agricultural education. This year Horticulture Instructor Stephen Dolan received the Honorary FFA Bay State Award in recognition of his outstanding service in the advancement of agricultural education.
- The Cooperative Education (Co-Op) program placed a total of 62 junior and senior students to work with local businesses, enhancing their skills through Co-Op placements. Senior internships for Health and Dental were not active this year due to COVID-19.
- Athletics offered a modified sports program due to COVID-19 restrictions. The following teams did compete competitively: football, volleyball, girls and boys soccer, baseball, cross-country, golf, ice hockey, girls and boys lacrosse, girls softball and tennis.

Technical Highlights from 2020-21

The school was not open to the public for services this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

- The Auto Collision program graduated 100% of its seniors and 80% of those seniors were employed as of graduation day. This program completed jobs for local town departments and Habitat for Humanity.
- The Auto Technology program significantly altered their curriculum to increase shop time for 9th and 10th grades.
- The Carpentry Department accomplished many carpentry projects, despite the COVID-19 pandemic. Five of their seniors participate in the Co-Op program. The department is a member of the Home Builders and Remodelers of Cape Cod.

- In the Cosmetology program six seniors completed their Massachusetts State Board Exams. All students are certified in the Barbicide disinfectant training and SP/2 Safety Training.
- Culinary Arts had great success in 2021 including filling 100% of their freshman seats, restructuring their curriculum delivery, and receiving the highest possible score for food service operation from the Harwich Board of Health on multiple inspections.
- Dental Assisting students were active in community service events at local preschools, veteran centers and Angel House. The program added new equipment and software to their curriculum and they are working towards expanding clinical experience at the community college.
- The Design & Visual Communications program is working hard to boost the new school's look in all things involving design and presentation. The new building's technology and equipment have provided opportunities to push the students' knowledge.
- The Electrical Department earned praise from the DESE safety inspector for work station safety. This shop was the number one shop chosen by freshmen as they explored their placement options.
- Engineering Technology sophomores learned to program and fly drones; juniors completed 3D Design and Analysis in dual-enrollment with the community college; seniors received a grant from the MIT Club of Cape Cod to design, 3D print and build a personal transport using a skateboard or scooter concept.
- The Health Technologies students were impacted by the pandemic in terms of practicing their trade. They were unable to do internships at the hospital or nursing homes. Seniors did sit for the CNA exam. There was a new 9th grade shared program between Health and Dental.
- The Horticulture program did more outside work on the new campus. Within every live project there were opportunities using real experiences to teach technical skills and fundamental skill development.
- The HVAC program is now an approved training program for hours toward the MA State Refrigeration Technician license. All freshman earned Hot Works Certification. Ninety percent (90%) of HVAC upper-classmen went out on Co-Op placements.
- The Information Technology Program moved their sophomore curriculum to the freshman year to give 9th graders a head start in preparing for certifications. Thirty-one (31) students received certifications in specialty programs.
- Marine Services had seven students participate in Co-Op placements. In SkillsUSA, Marine Services students took home 1st Place, 2nd Place and 3rd Place Marine awards.
- The Plumbing Shop had seven students participate in Co-Op placements and 40% of their total students participated in SkillsUSA. The department's curriculum is teaching 21st Century skills to keep pace with fast changing boiler technology and new codes.

Academic Highlights from 2020-21

- The Business Education/21st Century Learning department offered several exciting activities: an online simulation to create a new business in a city; a Stock Market Game competition, and a virtual Credit for Life Fair in which students created a budget, navigated through various budget booths and virtually chatted with Cape Cod Five volunteers while doing so.
- The English Department learned a great deal this year about technology-based instruction and assessment to integrate it into the curriculum. As DESE continuously adjusted their MCAS requirements throughout the year the English department continuously adjusted curriculum and instruction to ensure that students were prepared.
- The Social Studies department focused heavily on teaching the historical and current event moments attached to the Civil Rights movements of the past up to the Black Life Matters movement of today.
- The Math Department also realigned 9th and 10th curriculum to the Next Gen MCAS computer based testing throughout the year and implemented online testing practice into their overall curriculum.
- The Science Department adjusted to changes this year: a new building with new labs, and remote learning - to hybrid classes - to 100% in person, while continuing to provide the students with meaningful and rigorous curricula.
- The Student Services Department attended countless webinars to learn best practices for navigating the pandemic with a focus on student mental health. A school-wide mental health screening was administered to identify students in crisis and needing mental health assistance.

Student Services Department

Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District's Students Services Department provides special education services including related services to students with disabilities from age three to twenty-two years old. The October, 2022 Student Information Management System report indicates that 598 students were receiving special education services.

Integrated preschool programs are located at the Marguerite E. Small Elementary School, West Yarmouth, and Ezra H. Baker Innovation School in West Dennis. The Assistant Director oversees these programs. Inclusive classrooms bring typically developing preschool age children into the program to serve as role models and give these students learning opportunities in a high-quality early education experience.

The district continues to work to increase the capacity of meeting the diverse needs of the students that it serves. The district has been in a partnership with the New England Center for Children (NECC), which is currently housed at Dennis-Yarmouth High School. The students with a diagnosis of autism who participate in the program are continuing to make remarkable strides. Additionally, the curriculum, Autism Curriculum Encyclopedia (ACE), portion of the program was implemented into the SPEEK and STAR programs several years ago and continues, due to its success. Two additional STAR programs have been added to the M.E. Small School. These programs are all supported with a BCBA who provides support to improve behavioral outcomes.

In 2018, the high school, Teens Insight to Discovering Emotional Stability (TIDES), was created to address the needs of struggling students both academically and behaviorally. The program provides students with a certified special educator, access to a school adjustment counselor and content teachers who work on organizational skills, social and academic prompts and regular communication with families. The district will continue to refine the current programming to assist with the changing needs of the population and support student needs. The high school serves our critical care program SEA 2, for students who have significant medical, communication and intellectual needs. The district will continue to refine the current programming to assist with the changing needs of the population and support student needs.

We have a Behavior Support Teacher for the elementary grades focusing on social-emotional learning in order to create positive behavior plans to increase time on learning for students who experience difficulty with self-regulation and meeting the high demands of the general education classroom. The goal has been to create behavior plans and support teachers in order to include students in their general education classrooms to the maximum extent possible. Additionally, at the Wixon School, the two self-contained programs that service and support students with autism and intellectual disabilities were created to provide consistent programming for these students as they move up from elementary school. As a district, we believe that students should be included with their same aged non-disabled peers, when appropriate, to the maximum extent possible.

It is my pleasure to submit the Annual Report of the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School Committee.

The year 2021 was once again a challenging year for education due to the continued COVID-19 pandemic. In accordance with the directives of the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, we have returned to 100% in-person learning. When school reopened in September, all of our students were once again educated within our school buildings. COVID precautions remained in place including face coverings for staff and students when indoors; social distancing; hand washing; contact tracing; and Test and Stay protocols. Vaccination clinics were held for staff and families. Our entire nursing staff is to be commended for their hard work keeping students and staff safe and healthy during the pandemic. All students were again able to access free breakfast and lunch at school provided by our excellent food service staff.

Many activities and traditions have slowly returned to the schools such as field trips, recognition ceremonies, and the fifth grade trip to the seashore.

Communication with our families continues to be of paramount importance. The district website is a helpful resource and Blackboard Connect calls keep families informed of important events. Mattacheese families can stay informed by tuning into the Live *Morning Announcements* on Mr. Bovino's YouTube Channel.

The high school had a successful fall sports program with the DY volleyball team winning the Cape and Islands League for the second straight year and advancing to the State Finals. The DY Marching Band & Color Guard was back in competition and won another Massachusetts State Championship. Their 2021 production "One" was about coming together again and celebrating the differences and similarities in all of us.

The construction of our new intermediate-middle school continues. Many of our students participated in the "Topping Off" ceremony in November with the ceremonial raising of the final beam. We are all excited to see the school being built with an anticipated opening in January of 2023.

Thank you to the communities of Dennis and Yarmouth for their continued support of the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District.

As we leave 2021 for 2022, I am reminded that on March 13, 2022, we will have lived through two years of “crisis” caused by the Coronavirus pandemic. Our staff and families have worked extremely hard to ensure our students continue to have the best educational experience possible despite the ongoing challenging conditions.

The beginning of 2021 started as 2020 ended-with some of our students in grades PreK-7 learning remotely while others attended in-person classes. At the high school level, our students followed a hybrid schedule with two days of in-person classes and three days of remote learning in order to follow the required physical distancing requirements. In most cases, at all levels, we were able to accommodate our families’ requests for either full in-person or full remote learning.

By the end of the 2020-2021 school year the Commissioner of Education required schools to reopen fully in-person. As Dennis-Yarmouth often does, we exceeded the timelines set forth by the Commissioner for opening additional in-person classes for all who wished to return. Space was still a challenge, so we set up general education classrooms in cafeterias, libraries, gymnasiums, music rooms, and art rooms. In Yarmouth, some students that typically would have attended the Station Avenue School instead attended the M. E. Small School, so we could maintain physical distancing requirements. Students continued to eat lunch in classrooms or outside when the weather permitted.

In May and June, we were able to reduce some of the previous distancing requirements and students were able to have masks off during outdoor activities. Graduation took place outdoors on time and many of the graduation activities that were canceled in 2020 were able to resume with some adjustments. It felt as if life were returning to “normal”.

When we opened in September 2021 we were required to open school for in-person learning for all students. Remote learning was no longer an option. For some families this pushed them to choose home-schooling. Typically, we found that this decision was health related. Thus, these students were no longer part of the Dennis Yarmouth Regional School District community.

Already this period of time is being studied by educational researchers to learn more about the impact on student learning and mental health. We were fortunate that early on we were able to bridge the digital divide because we had iPads for almost every student. However, some other challenges rose to the forefront, such as how to maintain relationships via “the screen”. Both educators, and students have found remote learning to be exhausting at times. For educators it was challenging to reimagine how to teach material in a remote environment that is best taught in-person. Educators were used to walking around, checking on students as they worked, listening to them read, or interacting to help keep students on task. For students and their families, the amount of time on screens with no privacy in the home or loss of employment due to lack of

childcare while students were learning remotely were big challenges. Both families and staff have lost family members due to the virus or other illness which also created an impact on mental health. Ways that people celebrated joyous occasions and/or a loved one's life all changed, causing significant impact.

When we received our MCAS results this fall for the spring of 2021, we found some drops in student performance. Our staff is working hard to fill in those gaps this year. Our concern in the current year is attendance for both staff and students. Beginning in September, we saw significant attendance issues caused by the virus and the need to quarantine. This will undoubtedly impact our students' academic performance during the current year, as remote learning is not allowed.

One ray of hope last year was the record number of students taking college and Advanced Placement courses. The scores were excellent. It appears that for students, their motivation and the knowledge and skills of their teachers helped to negate the impact of remote learning. Senior Capstone Projects helped to keep our students engaged through graduation. We remained hopeful!

Albert Einstein said, "Learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow. The important thing is not to stop questioning." As I look out the back window of my office, I am filled with hope as I see the progress of our intermediate-middle school building project. This is going to be an amazing school facility for our students as they move through the district. In November, we had the topping off ceremony as the school's last beam was put into place. Some of our students attended and here are a few of the things they had to say:

- I am excited for the computer room and all the amazing technology we will have.
- I'm excited for the new school because of the new outside and inside theaters, because I love to act.
- I'm excited for the new school because there will be a bigger space to learn and we will get to learn in a building that lots of people spent a lot of time working on and planning so we can have the best learning environment.
- I'm excited to be one of the first sixth graders in the new school. We are so lucky to have the new school and I can't wait to walk the amazing halls with my friends.
- I am excited because I just moved to America two months ago and I'm very glad that I'll get to be in a new environment and able to make new friends. Other schools will be close by there as well. I really want to run cross country because I'm really good at running. I'm going to try my best to make my teachers and family proud.
- I'm excited to be in a modern school and a futuristic environment.
- I'm excited for the new school because we will be the first students to enter and experience the new school.
- I'm excited for the new school because we will still be able to see our fourth-grade teachers and meet our new teachers.

We remain hopeful for the future of our students and hopeful for a world with them in charge.

DENNIS-YARMOUTH EARLY EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Dennis-Yarmouth Early Education program offers part-time/half-day Integrated Preschool experiences for children who reside in the Towns of Dennis and Yarmouth, as well as specialized programs for children with unique learning needs. DY Early Ed enrolls children with and without disabilities ages 3-5 years. Our classrooms are located at the E.H. Baker Innovation School in Dennis and M.E. Small Elementary School in West Yarmouth. Our morning program is for 3 and younger 4 year olds and our afternoon program is designed for 4 and 5 year olds heading to Kindergarten in the fall.

We have rolling admission. Children enter our program throughout the school year, as they turn 3 years of age. We maintain a wait-list when our fee-based programs are full. Our fee based program charge families a daily fee according to a families' household size and household gross monthly income, using the Massachusetts Sliding Fee Scale.

According to the October 2021 enrollment report, 62 students attend our program in Yarmouth and 28 students in Dennis. Thirty seven (37) of the children are three-years old, 52 are four-years old and one (1) is five-years old. Twenty four (24) of our children are dual language learners. It is anticipated that 53 of our children will be entering DY Kindergarten in the Fall of 2022. We engage in ongoing Child Find efforts – screening pre-school aged children throughout the school year who may be eligible for a Free and Appropriate Public Education/special education.

Each of our classes is taught by a Special Education/Early Education Teacher and is supported by Highly Qualified Special Education assistants. Our preschool curriculum follows the MA Early Childhood Program Standards and Guidelines for Preschool Learning Experiences. DY provides developmentally appropriate learning opportunities that promote language, social, emotional, cognitive and motor development through experiences rich in literacy, math and science. Individualized special education services are provided by Special Education Teachers, Speech-Language Pathologists, Occupational Therapists and Physical Therapists.

Community and family partnerships are vital in the education of young children. We subcontract with Cape Cod Children's Place and are part of the Cape Regional Ten Town Coordinated Family and Community Engagement (CRTT CFCE). During the 2019 - 2020 school year between 250-300 families of children between the ages of 0 and 8 years were served through the CRTT CFCE playgroups and family events.

FINANCE & OPERATIONS

David M. Flynn, Assistant Superintendent for Finance and Operations

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District continued to work through the many challenges presented by the COVID pandemic to make academic gains and programmatic improvements during 2021. We have closed out the FY 2021 budget year, we are currently managing the FY 2022 budget of \$67,251,942, and we are in the midst of preparing the FY 2023 budget. Last year, the state certified the District's Excess & Deficiency (E+D) fund balance at \$2,774,432 of which \$992,548 was used to support the FY 2022 budget.

The new Intermediate Middle School broke ground on April 30, 2021. The project is coming along on schedule and under budget. We look forward to our students and staff occupying the new school in January of 2023. As always, we truly appreciate the continued community support of the school budget and the new building project.

COVID continued to dramatically impact our society and our schools in 2021. The District recognizes the effectiveness of onsite learning compared to remote only learning as well as noting the social-emotional learning benefits for students attending onsite learning. The District schools returned to full onsite learning five days per week in April 2021. Upon returning to school in September, COVID physical distancing requirements and mask mandates were still in place. The Federal ESSER II grant totaling over \$2,200,000 has allowed the District to continue to provide necessary PPE such as masks, gloves, air purifiers and other COVID related supplies as well as address the need for additional medical and instructional staff hired for the new year.

The District continues to value our partnerships with many groups and organizations in our communities. Our schools continue to partner with outside organizations to raise funds or seek contributions to support our students, whether it be through groups such as Create The Good, the Yarmouth Rotary and the Dennis-Harwich Rotary, the Lion's Club, Behavioral Health Innovators, Teen Achievers and the many booster clubs supporting our sports and music programs, as well as local charitable foundations.

The District is continuing our work to address the long-term trend of declining enrollment. As of October 2021, the in-District enrollment was 2,828 with 104 students from other school districts coming to Dennis-Yarmouth under the school choice program. The District continues to take active steps to implement our school choice motto of "retain, recruit and return" and we anticipate increased numbers of school choice students in the coming years. We are also continuing our work to promote the D-Y Advantage and decrease the outflow of students to charter schools.

Facilities Manager Sandra Cashen continues to lead our small yet effective facilities department, which depends on a small group of skilled staff to maintain our buildings and handle small scale repairs effectively and efficiently. Steve Faucher leads our grounds crew which maintains the best-kept playing fields on Cape Cod. Together, our

grounds and maintenance teams oversee nearly 700,000 square feet of building space and more than 260 acres of outdoor areas.

Food Service Director Rooney Powers and her staff continue to go above and beyond to ensure that no student goes hungry in our schools. Under the current program of universal free breakfast and lunch, Rooney and her staff have prepared and distributed over 200,000 meals since the start of school this year in September. It is impossible to overestimate the importance of this vital program in ensuring that all of our students have access to quality meals every day.

In conclusion, I would like to thank everyone in our communities for the opportunity to serve the students of the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District. I look forward to working with families, residents, faculty and staff members, and community officials in the upcoming year for the continued support of our schools. Together we are the Home of the D-Y Advantage.

OFFICE OF INSTRUCTION

Elizabeth Pontius- Director of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math)
Sherry Santini- Director of Humanities and the Arts

The Office of Instruction plans and coordinates all aspects of learning, manages federal and state accountability mandates, and provides professional learning opportunities for all educators. To support and extend these key efforts, the Directors are continually involved in grant writing. Working to support the district strategic plan, implement improvement plans, and organize professional development, we continually focus on learning for all – students, teachers, administrators, and support staff.

Research has shown that teaching quality and school leadership are the most important factors in raising student achievement. Amidst the continuing pandemic conditions, our primary goals for the 2021-2022 school year emphasize 3 priorities which will help us set course for the next several years:

1. To foster a sense of belonging and partnership among students and families.
2. To continuously monitor students' understanding.
3. To ensure strong grade-appropriate instruction.

To accomplish our academic goals, we provide our students and educators with high quality curriculum resources, a robust support staff, and a cadre of instructional coaches. We have ten district instructional coaches, including K-5 literacy coaches, math coaches for grades PreK-3 and 4-8, a K-5 STEM coach, and one Technology coach. These content professionals specialize in providing effective support and guidance for teachers as best practices are transferred from district initiatives to classroom instruction. They are an invaluable resource for teachers and administrators as the district continues to provide all students with a rigorous and well-rounded educational experience.

Dennis-Yarmouth schools work closely with higher education partners to enhance and update all our programs. We continue our long-term partnership with Lesley University to establish the Literacy Collaborative model, which supports literacy coaching in the primary and intermediate grades. This project is in year nine and includes extensive professional development for grades kindergarten through five staff as well as on-site coaching support.

The district continues to address the social-emotional needs of all students in a wide array of research-based strategies. The Dolphin Way explicitly teaches and reinforces student behavior that is respectful, responsible, and safe in all areas of the school and to their peers and teachers. Mindfulness strategies are interwoven with elements from resources such as The Zones of Regulation, Second Step, and Strong Start in our kindergarten through grade seven classes to provide students with the tools they need to self-regulate their behavior and successfully manage emotions.

STEM education is important because it plays a role in every part of our children's lives. At Dennis Yarmouth, it is our goal to embed STEM experiences into all content areas. We are in year 2 implementation with our science curriculum resource (K-8), STEMscopes. This curriculum provides opportunities for our students to participate in engineering design projects.

High-quality instructional materials have an increased positive impact on student learning when paired with curriculum-specific, ongoing professional learning. The Dennis-Yarmouth school district is in the process of establishing a professional development partnership with The Center for Science Education at Tufts University. We are looking forward to introducing high-quality coursework for teachers in the summer of 2022 to support effective implementation.

Our District acquired a Digital Literacy and Computer Science (DLCS) Grant for the 20-21 school year. We continue to progress toward our goal of having Computer Science education for all students in all grade levels.

This year the district was awarded an Accelerating Mathematics for Students grant. This grant pays for our digital access to Eureka Math's Digital intervention and assessment platform K-12.

The Eureka Math curriculum resource was adopted K-12 in 2016-2017. As we continue to monitor the implementation, our Curriculum Leadership Councils (composed of educators in grades K-8) are working on a formal review process. The Math Department at DYHS is likewise reviewing the program of studies in order to assess the successes and challenges of our resources.

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District continues to educate all students who will become productive members of our global society. In partnership with our families and communities, we look to fulfill our mission, Empowering Each Student to Achieve Excellence with Integrity in a Changing World.

TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Ross Bryant, Director of Technology

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District Technology Department provides services to all schools and the central office. The department supports the infrastructure necessary to maintain the district networks, repairs hardware, installs software, files for grants- both entitlement and competitive, works with students with special needs to incorporate assistive technologies into their Individual Education Plans, and provides professional development to staff to integrate technology into the curriculum.

There are four technicians and one technology associate in the Technology Department. The technicians maintain the computers, printers, iPads, and other instructional technology across the district. The technology associate maintains the district databases of hardware and software, assists in managing the work order system, assists with the production/support of iPads and supports the district's technology help desk. The technology team supports over 1,700 desktop/laptop computers and over 3,600 iPads. All iPads can access the internet through the wireless access points which the department supports across seven buildings.

In 2021, the district provided new iPads to incoming grade 4 and grade 8 students as well as grade 3, grade 6, and grade 7 teachers. School to school networking hardware was upgraded or reconfigured to support faster and more reliable network communications. Aging wireless access points and network switches continue to be replaced on a yearly basis. Remote and hybrid learning came to a close in 2021, with a new focus placed on returning to in person learning and classroom configurations. The district replaced 25 aging Smartboards and projectors with new LCD interactive touch panels.

The Technology Department also provides support for the equipment, skills, and network needed for the successful implementation of online MCAS testing. Students in grades 3-8 and grade 10 all take MCAS tests on iPads. The 2021 testing was adjusted to support the remote learning environment.

The Technology Department supports teachers and students using technology for teaching and learning. JoAnna Watson, the Assistant Director of Digital Learning and Library Services, offered guidance and support for remote learning for teachers as well as students via Zoom. Professional development workshops, a graduate level course, 1:1 Zoom sessions and bi-weekly group meetings via Zoom provided instruction and ideas for staff to efficiently use a variety of technology daily to prepare students with 21st century technology skills, both for in-person and remote learning.

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District Technology Department makes every effort to stay current on emerging technologies to best serve the school community and ensure strong support of its technological needs.

FOOD SERVICE DEPARTMENT

Rooney Powers, Director

The Dennis-Yarmouth Food Service Department faced huge challenges in 2021, but once again we had another successful year. The Covid-19 pandemic forced us to make adjustments to our preparation, cooking and service methods. Due to the need to social distance, the students ate their meals in the classrooms and alternative spaces instead of the cafeteria. Both breakfasts and lunches were packed up by the staff and delivered to these spaces for the safety of the students and staff.

The Dennis-Yarmouth Food Service Department participated in the USDA Covid-19 free meals benefit program. All students had access to daily free breakfasts and lunches without needing to qualify through the standard application process. This was a welcomed comfort to our families through the ongoing struggles of the Covid-19 pandemic. Participation grew across all schools due to the cost free availability of meals to all of the students. More kids than ever are now eating the healthy, nutritious meals that we are so proud to prepare and serve.

The Dennis-Yarmouth Food Service Department once again operated the USDA Summer Food Service Program and provided free meals to the children of our community during the summer of 2021. We partnered with both the Dennis and Yarmouth recreation departments as well as the Boy Scouts of Camp Greenough to provide lunches to all participants.

Through our cooperative bidding, specifically selected government programs and the use of local vendors, we have been able to keep costs controlled and were able to finish the school year in the black. For school year 2020-21 the food cost ran at 40%, labor costs were 50% and all other costs were 10%.

The success of this challenging year cannot go without the recognition of the amazing food service workers. They have gone above and beyond with their flexibility and efforts. Their dedication to feeding the students of the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District is a huge asset to our community.

DENNIS-YARMOUTH REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

Dr. Paul A. Funk, Principal

I am pleased to report on the progress of Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School. I feel that students, faculty and staff have worked extremely hard throughout the Covid-19 pandemic to provide quality education to all our students. During the 2020-2021 school year Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School used a hybrid teaching model due to Covid-19 guidelines. I am happy to report that this year we have had a full return to in-person instruction. Students and staff are required to wear masks and follow all the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary guidelines but we are all back in person. DYRHS total enrollment for this school year is 901. Our school nursing staff has done an incredible job making sure the students are safe and following all the Covid-19 protocols. We have instituted a test and stay program for any student or staff member that becomes a close contact to a Covid positive individual.

Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School offered a successful fall sports program. Students participated in boys and girls soccer, field hockey, boys and girls cross country, football and boys golf. The DY volleyball team won the Cape and Islands League for the second straight year and advanced all the way to the State Finals, losing in a hard fought match to Old Rochester. We are currently in the middle of our winter sports season and have roughly 300 athletes participating in boys and girls ice hockey, boys and girls basketball and boys and girls winter track.

The D-Y Marching Band & Color Guard was back in competition this fall. Our band and color guard are the only competitive band and color guard on Cape Cod. This season was extremely memorable as they won another Massachusetts State Championship. Their 2021 production "One" was about coming together again and celebrating the differences and similarities in all of us. Composed of about 50 students, the marching band & color guard had their first competitive season since 2019. They worked extremely hard and won the state title. The community can see the DY Marching Band & Color Guard perform at our home football games during halftime.

The D-Y Theater Company, under the direction of new drama teacher and director Samantha McMahon, put on a successful fall play. The play was *The Odd Couple* and was a huge success.

The D-Y Jazz Band and Chorus had an extremely successful winter holiday concert. The performance was outstanding. The students, under the direction of Music Director Alex Pendleton and Chorus teacher Stephanie Riley, were incredible. D-Y also had a successful strings concert this winter led by music teacher Kerry Cutler.

D-Y continues to be an Equal Opportunity School; we have worked hard with our staff and students to create academic opportunities for our minority and low-income students. The goal of EOS is to develop a system that allows students who would not otherwise think of taking advanced placement classes, to enroll in an AP class.

D-Y's School-to-Careers educator Lisa Fedy, along with Guidance Department Chair Dale Fornoff, Science Department Chair Amy Chausse, and Kara Galvin from the Workforce Investment Board worked on and were awarded an Innovative Pathways grant of \$25,000 to help with student experiential learning. This will allow us to improve our school-to-career programs. These programs include student internships, job shadowing, job placements, and other real world experiences that our students will have the opportunity to participate in.

The students and staff at Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School continue to strive and work hard throughout these unique times. As building principal I am proud of the work our teachers have done and the programs we continue to offer our students throughout this challenging school year.

I am pleased to report on the progress of the Wixon School. We continue to work with nearly 450 fourth and fifth grade students from mostly Dennis and Yarmouth. We are pleased to greet students from both towns and have these students form stronger relationships inside and outside of the classroom.

At Wixon, we have begun to return to the educational experience that was prevalent before the pandemic. Students are back in person learning. The Grade 4 academic experience is similar to what children experience in their K-3 school. The main difference is the students share a teacher for either Social Studies or Science. In Grade 5, students are on two person teaching teams where our teachers specialize in two of the four content areas. Students also enjoy Related Arts classes. The children cycle through the different Related Arts classes (Physical Education, Art, Music, and Library). Children also have Health class weekly during one of their Physical Education classes.

Chorus, Orchestra and Band instruction have returned to Wixon. We now are able to also have group rehearsals at the end of the school day. The end of the school day also is a time where teachers, in their teacher teams, can offer academic support, extension, and enrichment activities. This menu of activities used to be a school wide effort but now we offer a smaller version to keep students in cohorts. Scheduling time at the end of the school day is imperative to ensure we can provide students grade level instruction and catch up on things that may have been missed during the pandemic.

While the pandemic has forced many changes, it has also made us problem solve and think creatively. Instead of waiting for COVID to end, we now do what we can to ensure COVID is not the reason we cannot enjoy many fun activities. For example, we have continued one of our festive traditions at Wixon. Winter Wonderland is a hallmark of the student's experience at Wixon. The "Best Field Day on the Cape" happened last school year and is still planned for the current school year. Students are now returning to the seashore for day trips and overnight trips are scheduled for the spring of 2022 for our 5th grade students.

We would also like to thank our Wixon families for being such a support during the school year. PTO membership continues to increase. With the onset of a new school in the immediate future, the PTO of Wixon and Mattacheese look to combine forces before the next school year. With a combined organization we will have an increase in membership and more parental involvement. Also regarding teamwork, the staffs at Wixon and Mattacheese have already done some work together to better get to know one another before we join forces in the new school building. We love our school at Wixon but also look forward to working in a brand new environment next school year.

As we begin 2022, we thank everyone who has helped and supported the Wixon School!

EZRA H. BAKER INNOVATION SCHOOL

I am pleased to report on the progress of the Ezra H. Baker Innovation School. When the year began in January, we had twenty in person classes as well as four remote classes at our school. Throughout the spring, more and more students returned to in person schooling. While we continued to take Covid mitigation seriously, hopes were high that we were slowly returning to normal practices. Throughout the winter and spring, our school community gathered remotely for reading nights, and we reimaged our end of year third grade celebration as an in-school, outdoor parade!

When school reopened in September, all of our students were once again educated within our school building. We opened with twenty-five classrooms, five at each grade level, K-3, two Early Education classrooms, and three specialized instruction classrooms. Class sizes were kept reasonably small. Students were also able to return to the Related Arts classrooms for gym, art, music, and library. Because each student is issued an iPad for school use, we were able to dismantle our computer lab and create a "Maker Space." In this area, students now work on developing science, technology, engineering, and math skills.

While we heralded this small return to normalcy, many of our Covid precautions remained in place. Students continued to wear face coverings indoors, ate lunch in their classrooms, and stayed with the same small cohort of students throughout the entire day. As the year progressed, we realized that our return to normalcy would be a series of small steps. We began to return to those practices that were safest to return to, while adapting those new practices that had proven most successful for enhancing student learning.

When we returned in September, we bid farewell to three long term staff members at our school. Mrs. Roberta Silva acted as an assistant at our school for many years. Her calm manner and genuine affection for students helped many to succeed. Mrs. Patricia Johnson served as our teacher in a specialized classroom for students with health needs. Her genuine care for her students and their families was only surpassed by her unshakeable belief that all of her students could learn and achieve despite health challenges. Ms. Amy Pearson was a kindergarten teacher at our school who helped so many young learners develop the routines and skills they needed to ignite a passion and love for learning. Countless students prospered due the diligence and hard work from these educators. They are sorely missed at our school but we wish Amy, Tricia and Roberta long and happy retirements.

As we move forward, we are excited by the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead. We know that our young students are eager to make a difference in the world. We look forward to restarting our student philanthropy program and offering other opportunities for our students to use their developing academic skills to pursue their passions. Students are eager to start a recycling program, while our young writers are looking for

outlets to publish their work. We hope to safely restore our before school care program as well as our curriculum based field trip program.

Looking ahead, we realize that our students' success is nourished by the support they receive from the community. Our families support us in countless ways, most notably by trusting us to keep students safe while learning during this unprecedented time. As always, our town, the Police Department, the Fire Department, the Recreation Department, and the Town and Village Libraries, seek opportunities to support our young learners. Working together, the young students at the Ezra H. Baker Innovation School are thriving.

MATTACHEESE MIDDLE SCHOOL

Michael J. Bovino, Principal

Mattacheese Middle School opened its doors in 1969 and is currently a sixth and seventh grade school servicing approximately 426 students. There are 130 male students and 97 female students in 6th grade and 97 male students and 101 female students in 7th grade. Sixty percent of our families are identified as low income.

Middle school is a time of significant and important development for students. Our school's goal is to ensure that students feel safe, secure, and welcome here within the building. It is essential that our school is a place where our entire staff is supportive of students during adolescence. We proudly create structures and routines that make our youth feel comfortable and safe.

When we reopened school this year, we returned to full time in-person learning. In order for us to limit the spread of Covid-19, our staff is responsible for keeping detailed documentation in connection to where students sit in class and who they work with. We are providing teachers and students with as much of a typical middle school experience as possible.

Mattacheese Middle School continues to make a strong commitment to communicate with our students, families, and community. Families can view our student-run MMS Newscast, which is shared on our website. Our families can access information about MMS by tuning into our *Live Morning Announcements* on the principal's YouTube Channel, following our MMS Facebook page, and reading our weekly *Mattacheese Matters*. Our school website is another helpful resource. We often reach out to families with Connect Calls for important school wide events. Plusportal is a platform that parents and students can monitor their live individualized information about a student's progress. Regularly accessing the portal can improve a student's achievement. Our teachers also use technology tools, such as Google Classroom and Remind, to keep students and families informed of classroom assignments. Our school counselors and office staff are always available to assist families navigate these apps and websites.

Recognition ceremonies are held each trimester to celebrate student achievements. These ceremonies are live streamed remotely so that families are able to celebrate their individual child's achievements. Shout-outs to students who have demonstrated the Dolphin Way of being respectful, responsible and resourceful are read every morning during announcements. Families are invited periodically to attend our speaker series assemblies, concerts, and plays. We appreciate all parents and guardians who are

active participants within our Mattacheese community and invite all others to join us as we continue to strengthen our relationships.

Our teachers exemplify their dedication by repeatedly showing their support for their students. We need to recognize the uniqueness of students at this age and we are fortunate to have a staff that enjoy the middle school students and love educating this age group. Our educators are aware of the developmental changes that youth experience as they move from elementary to middle school.

Leadership opportunities are available to students throughout the year. All students are eligible to apply to be members of the ambassador program. Students in the program take a lead role in many public events throughout the school year. Bilingual student Ambassadors have an incredible role translating languages for families who do not speak English, creating a welcome and supportive atmosphere for families and incoming students.

There is something for everyone at Mattacheese. The schedule is designed to allow all students to have access to a variety of course offerings designed to meet their specific learning goals. Our mission is to meet the educational needs of all our students. We encourage a culture of cross-collaboration among schools as well. In the past, the D-Y Jazz Band has visited MMS to perform for our student body. These opportunities allow the students at MMS to catch a glimpse of coming attractions at the next destination of their DY educational experience.

Mattacheese focuses on Academics, Athletics and the Arts. Beyond the classroom, we provide over twenty free after school activities each semester, including but not limited to: musical opportunities, robotics, beekeeping, community service opportunities, dances, student newscasts, advisory groups, career day, and Model U.N., as well as a full complement of interscholastic athletics. Mattacheese is committed to educating children socially, emotionally, and academically as they grow into young adults.

We are continuing our efforts with the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) and our local Building Committee to build a state of the art building for our middle school students. As Principal of the Station Avenue Elementary School (SAE), it is my pleasure to submit this Annual Report. SAE is now in its 27th year of operation. The construction of the new intermediate/middle school is well underway right beside SAE. Our grade 3 students participated in the ceremonial raising of the final beam in November and are excitedly seeing their future school being built.

During the 2020-2021 school year, we had offered both in person and remote learning models. For this current school year, we returned to a full in person model at SAE. With updated guidance from the state, we were able to accommodate our full enrollment of 435 students into 23 classroom sections. Please join me in thanking our school nurse, Mrs. DiPrete, and our District Nurse leader, Kristin Dwyer, who work tirelessly each day for students and families as we navigate the continued COVID pandemic. Mrs. Gauvin and our top notch cafeteria staff continue to provide daily breakfast at kiosks throughout the school and full service lunches which are delivered to classrooms.

At SAE, students are provided with a full range of academic and social curriculum opportunities which help them to grow as students and future citizens of our community. We continue to provide instruction in Literacy, Math, Science and Social Studies. This year, we were fortunate to expand our staffing with support intervention teachers in reading and math with a model where they are connected to one grade level and classroom. This allows for more time and flexibility with students. All students have an iPad that can be used for learning both in and out of school. We continue to utilize technology for meetings, Open House, and conferences with families. Our Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports model (PBIS) focuses us on our school motto- *At Station Avenue we care about being: SAFE, RESPECTFUL, RESPONSIBLE and CARING.* While we are not able to have our All School Meetings together, we have virtual meetings that feature many of our community building themes.

Our PTO continues to support our students in a variety of ways including Scholastic News subscriptions, Nicky's school-home communication folders, much needed recess equipment for each individual classroom along with a variety of other things. We even held our annual Fun Run event virtually engaging the entire school community.

Once again, we are very grateful for the generous support and donation of school supplies and coats for our students in need by the Masonic Angel Fund of Yarmouth, food and meals donated by Cape Kids Meals, gift cards for student supplies from Fill-A-Back-Pack, and dictionaries for our grade three students from the Elks Lodge #1549 of Hyannis. Likewise in our school's spirit of giving back to the community, we are proud to support the Yarmouth Food Pantry. Finally, our partnership with the Yarmouth Police and Fire Departments in support of school safety drills and staff training is greatly appreciated. We are also thankful to the Town of Yarmouth Department of Health for working so closely with us in all aspects of health and safety related to COVID 19.

MARGUERITE E. SMALL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

As the interim principal for the 2021-2022 school year, I am honored to submit this report to the town of Yarmouth on behalf of Marguerite E. Small Elementary School. Our school is now in its 58th year of serving students from the communities of Dennis and Yarmouth. We provide a caring and safe learning environment for all of our students.

This year, in accordance with the directives of the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, we have returned to 100% in-person learning. Covid mitigation remains paramount and to that end, all aspects of our school day are structured around maintaining the health and safety of our MES community amid the pandemic. Classrooms are cohorted for lunch and recess as well as all learning activities. Social distancing, mask wearing, and hand washing are embedded in our daily routines. Contact tracing and Test and Stay protocols are also implemented when necessary. Attention to these measures affords us the ability to safely focus on learning.

The M.E. Small learning community is home to 291 students, serving students from age three to grade three. We have twenty-one classrooms, three pre-kindergarten, four each for kindergarten through third grade, and two specialized instruction classrooms. Our kindergarten through third grade enrollment includes 16% special education students as well as 32% English language learners. Our average class size is fourteen. Each grade level team is composed of four classroom teachers, an interventionist, a special education teacher, and an English language development teacher.

Our students thrive due to the nurturing support of their families, our educators, and the enduring commitment of the towns of Dennis and Yarmouth. We look forward to continuing to serve our community.
